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

Residents object to borehole project

□ A public hearing was held Monday by the county commission.

More than 60 area residents voiced their concerns and objections about the impact a deep borehole field test could have in the region during a Monday county commission public hearing.

"I am here to let you know on behalf of my wife, children and grandchildren, we are 100 percent against this project," said Ed

Hughes, a land owner in Nara Visa where the project is to be placed.

Atlanta-based ENERCON and DOSECC Exploration Services of Salt Lake City were selected by the Department of Energy last month to begin exploring the possibility of conducting a deep borehole field test near Nara Visa in Quay County. Boreholes are narrow, vertical holes drilled deep into the earth — approximately three miles below the earth's surface in the case of the proposed project. The test is meant to determine if boreholes are plausible for long-term nuclear waste storage.

County commissioners passed an ordinance in October 2016 in support of the project.

Area residents had also spoken out about the project at the Jan. 30 Quay County Commission meeting held in the 10th Judicial District Courtroom in Tucumcari.

Before residents commented at the city hearing, Project Manager Marc Eckles of DOSECC made a presentation about the project and scope of work that would be done by the company.

"There will be no nuclear waste involved in this project," Eckles told those gathered, adding that the project is purely research-based with zero chance of any waste of any kind being placed in the boreholes.

Hughes said the project will have negative impact on the county in the

long run with negative impacts far outweighing the potential boost to the economy.

He said one of the main concerns is if the test is conducted in Nara Visa and is successful, is the DOE going to simply complete the project and walk away?

How likely is it that the DOE will do testing, have success and then move on to an untested site to proceed? Hughes asked, adding that it would make sense for the DOE to proceed with the project in an area where it already has the support of the local communities and governments. He said the DOE would also

her hopeful that the business will do well and grow.

"It's not on the sign, but we call ourselves Tucumcari Donuts," she said.

Yon said currently the shop is making a variety of donuts, including blueberry, cake, cream and jelly filled, as well as traditional glazed and maple frosted donuts and cinnamon rolls. She said the shop even has kolaches, pillow puffs of soft dough with regular and jalapeno sausage

inside. "We want to try making more items like burritos, but right now, it's hard just to keep up with what we are making," Yon said. She said as soon as the door opens, Sao is working non-stop to keep the shelves filled with donuts. She said

they have talked about hiring help, and she hopes once they do, she can expand on menu items and choices.

The Donut Shop is open from 5 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday-Sunday and is located on the 700 block of East Route 66.

want to conduct the project in an area where the soil and bedrock characteristics are similar.

"If I wanted to start a vineyard in Quay County, I wouldn't plant grapes in Nevada to see if they would grow and comeback to start my business," said Logan resident TJ Smith, adding that if Quay County opens the door and has geological formations that can be used to store nuclear waste, there is no way to close that door again.

"This is the most important decision we will ever make in our lifetime," Smith said, adding that nuclear waste like plutonium has a life of 240,000 years.

"We are going to stand together and say 'not in our back yard,' or we are going to, for the lack of better words, drink the Kool-Aid," he said.

Smith said the type of jobs to be created by the project are not the type of jobs he wants for his county's future.

"The possibility of boreholes being used to store nuclear waste is the whole reason we are here," Hughes said. "The risk for environmental impact on this region is great during and after the testing."

Hughes said to drill the test holes, the companies will have to go through the Ogallala Aquifer that supplies drinking water to Quay County, and there is a chance for contaminating the aquifer during drilling or if there were a leak from waste.

"I have several decades of drilling experience," Eckles responded. "I have not had any measures put in place to prevent the contamination of water sources fail."

Eckles said metal casings will be used to line the borehole to prevent any contamination of the aquifer.

Hughes said the impact of the contamination of the water by the drilling or later

by the leaking of nuclear waste is just to much of a risk.

Eckles said there will be language in the contract between the companies and James that will guarantee that no nuclear waste will be placed in the holes during this project.

County Attorney Warren Frost said according to New Mexico statutes, any time nuclear waste is going to be stored, an agreement must be reached between the federal government and a state task force and legislative subcommittee, and after an agreement is reached, it must be approved by the state legislature and the governor.

"Even if the companies do not keep their word as they have given here today, there is a mechanism in place where the state has to approve any waste storage," Frost said, adding that Quay County needs a memorandum of understanding signed by the land owner, county and DOE, giving the county authority to seek injunctive

relief if the DOE ever tries to use the site for the disposal of waste.

"When a company comes in and offers economic revitalization, it is a very receptive concept," Smith said. "Residents want to hear more about how this will make their community better."

He added that anyone would be naive to think the project would revitalize Nara Visa economy, because contractors are not going to stay there, and infrastructure cannot be created on the short term.

County Commissioners will have the ordinance placed back on the agenda for consideration again when they meet in two weeks, according to Chairman Franklin McCasland.

Eckles said he and other officials will meet with residents and discuss more information about the project and their concerns during a public outreach meeting at 6 p.m. Tuesday at the Nara Visa Community Center.

Review reveals concerns at police department

The Tucumcari Police Department's operations and procedures have been under scrutiny recently due to residents and police officers coming forward with concerns, according to Tucumcari city officials.

City Manager Jared Langenegger said he began to look into concerns regarding the police department in August 2016 after receiving several inquiries from the public, officers within the department and other law enforcement agencies.

Langenegger said the process included an internal review by two external consultants of procedures, as well as a review of evidence procedures, policies, officer training, supervisory command structure, inventory,

law enforcement, incident reporting and department administration.

In October, Moriarty Police Chief Bobby Garcia conducted an inventory of the TPD's evidence and property. In addition to Garcia's inspection, former State Police Lt. Nathan Wallace conducted an operational review of the department.

Wallace completed an extensive review of the department on Jan. 31 and provided a complete report with issues of concern noted and recommendations for correction.

The review process identified several areas of concern within the department.

The evidence inventory that was conducted found concerns with firearms inventories, securing nar-

cotics and tracking of currency. The review found an unusually high error rate for the amount of evidence being handled.

The operational review identified deficiencies in field training of officers, reporting of incidents, investigations and personnel administration.

"It is clear based off of these reviews that there is a lack of structure and accountability that needs to be addressed at the Tucumcari Police Department," Langenegger said.

Based on the information gathered, Langenegger said he hired an external contractor to conduct a complete review of the department.

Wallace, the state police officer, spent nearly 200 hours reviewing departmen-

tal operations prior to submitting his report.

"While I am not happy about the issues found, the first step to correcting a problem is to identify the issue", said Langenegger. "Our new police chief will begin work on Feb. 14, 2017, and we will begin working immediately to address the concerns noted. He will have his hands full, but based on his qualifications and experience, I am confident that he will be able to handle the situation. Our ultimate goal is to ensure the safety and best interest of the citizens of Tucumcari."



Country could use more of the Gorsuch approach

Another day, another administration and Senate, another partisan fight that catches a highly qualified Supreme Court candidate in the crosshairs.

Democrats complain with some justification that Republicans should have taken up the nomination of well-qualified Merrick Garland late in President Obama's term.

But the Democrat and liberal reaction to President Trump's nomination of Judge Neil Gorsuch of the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals, claiming that he's "dangerous," "extreme" and "outside the mainstream," borders on farce.

While his record favors allowing elected representatives rather than bureaucrats to "make" the law, no one can seriously suggest he would vote for radical rewriting of the law in cases such as *Roe vs. Wade*. And there is no question Gorsuch is qualified.

He would fill the vacancy created by the death of Antonin Scalia, one of the court's most conservative justices.

Albuquerque attorney Andy Schultz says Gorsuch has a reputation for being "remarkably prepared and really pushing attorneys to the edges of their arguments, not because he's a bully in any sense but because he really wants to know how far the law can go. In that sense, he will fit in very well with this current Supreme Court."

Former New Mexico Supreme Court Justice Paul Kennedy has argued cases before Gorsuch at the 10th Circuit.

"He is an enormous intellect — a really, really bright guy. In terms of his demeanor, he was great."

There is no chance Senate Democrats can block Gorsuch short of a filibuster, with Senate Republicans failing to get 60 votes for cloture to stop it — unless Senate Republicans follow suit and change the rule by using the so-called nuclear option. That would allow a vote to go forward on a simple majority. Former Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., did that in 2013 when Democrats were in power to cover all appointments except Supreme Court.

It is not in the best interests of the Senate to exercise the nuclear option. Democrats should participate fully in hearings and then allow a vote to go forward based on that record.

Some New Mexicans will remember Gorsuch in a case that made headlines here.

In May 2011, a student at Cleveland Middle School interrupted physical education class by fake burping repeatedly.

The teacher sent the boy into the hall, where he continued to poke his head back into the classroom and burp some more. The teacher called the "school resource officer," an APD officer assigned to the school, who arrested the boy, handcuffed him and took him to a juvenile detention facility for violating New Mexico's school disruption law.

The boy's mother sued the principal, an assistant principal and the police officer, claiming the arrest violated her son's constitutional rights.

A federal district court ruled in favor of the school officials and police officer, and the mother appealed, focusing only on the police officer.

Though the 10th Circuit ruled 2-1 in favor of the officer, Gorsuch's respectful, well-reasoned dissent, which included a quote by Charles Dickens, pointed to case law that held that trivial interference with the educational process doesn't amount to a crime, and that there must be a "more substantial, more physical" disruption of school operations to justify arrest.

While neither N.M. Sens. Tom Udall nor Martin Heinrich, both Democrats, have said whether they plan to vote for or against Gorsuch's nomination, the country could use more of the Gorsuch approach and less of the hyperpartisanship that is crippling this nation.

Session visit instructive, chaotic

If you're looking for an instructive experience that is also a lesson in balancing control and chaos, I would suggest a visit to New Mexico's State Capitol while the Legislature is in session.

The Roundhouse, as the building is known because it resembles a four-story doughnut, lies a few blocks beyond the history and luxury around Santa Fe Plaza.

I was there to represent the Quay County Health Council at the Legislature's Public Health Day. I hoped that others would go but ended up going alone.

I came to the Roundhouse armed with a display that showed both health council successes and Quay County's urgent health needs, and a box of star-shaped clips emblazoned with "Quay County Health Council."

I couldn't keep the magnified clips on the table for more than a few seconds. Only a few takers, however, asked about health councils.

I then learned I was chosen to be present while the Senate

approved a commemorative "memorial," praising health councils, which have not fared well in recent Roundhouse budget-cutting.

To prepare, we were ushered into the hallways behind the Senate chamber.

As we were stage-managed through the backstage corridors, we met some equally bewildered adults and a lot of wide-eyed teenagers and children also headed for the Senate floor.

One group included students at an Islamic school in Albuquerque.

A group of teenage boys wearing identical jerseys turned out to be a football team that another senator recognized and made honorary pages for the day.

Finally, our time came. As we sat facing the Senate and the public gallery above, Sen. Howie Morales read the memorial and the Senate approved it by acclamation. Then we left quietly.

At the same time, other health council representatives testified at a House committee hearing for a bill that would appropriate \$700,000 for health councils statewide. It passed through that committee and headed for the appropriations committee, where it meets an uncertain fate in a time of severe austerity. A similar bill in the Senate was awaiting a similar committee vote.

We returned to the Rotunda, the center of the Roundhouse doughnut, for a rally of sorts, to generate support for health councils.

I then set out to deliver literature to the offices of Rep. Dennis Roch and Sen. Pat Woods, who represent Quay County.

My path through the corridors around the Rotunda was clogged by hundreds of peo-

ple who had suddenly jammed into the Roundhouse.

I found the offices in corridors that buzzed with quietly intense people in dark suits carrying briefcases.

My delivery done, I squeezed my way through the sudden crowd to my display in the main corridor.

The multitude had gathered for a "Keep Your Hands Off Public Lands" rally in the Rotunda to protest the proposed opening of federal lands to mining and drilling. The near capacity crowd watched Native American dancers and heard quite a few outraged speakers.

Health councils were already yesterday's news, so I cleared my area and headed back to quiet, uneventful Tucumcari.
