## Keeping true to roots

Like cowboys of the past, cook-off teams rode out storms, snow.

TUCUMCARI — Chuck wagon teams and enthusiasts braved the harsh elements of a spring snow storm to take part in the 17th annual chuck wagon cook-off at Ute Lake State Park in Logan.

"Cowboys of the plains cooked in good and bad weather; this is authentic chuck wagon conditions," said Dean Decker of the Mountain Trails chuck wagon in Rye, Colorado.

Saturday's weather conditions were less than ideal for a chuck wagon cook-off. People huddled near the chuck wagons for warmth from the fires as the chicken fried steaks cooked in the cast iron skillets and cobbles simmered in Dutch Ovens.

The low was 35 degrees with north winds of 10 to 15 miles per hour and snow accumulations ranging from 2 to 5 inches across the county, according to Randall Hergert of the Albuquerque National Weather Service.

"It was so amazing of the chuck wagon teams to ride out the storm when they very well could have folded up tents and left," said Sharon Reid, event coordinator.

When teams on cattle drives ran into weather like this, they keep going; people have to eat, said Sam Howell of Cockerbur Camp chuck wagon out of Odessa, Texas.

Logan has always had its unique weather challenges during the cook-off; the key is to take it in stride, said Randy Whipple with the C4B chuck wagon of Amarillo, Texas.

Whipple said it was his first time to cook in such challenging conditions, but he and his team were determined to prevail over the elements.

"As long as the fires are burning,

everything is OK," said Jim Walter from Rising W chuck wagon out of Rochester, Texas.

Walter said Logan's event kicks off the year of competition for his team. He said Saturday's weather is just another factor that teams have to contend with during competition.

Reid said the determined spirit of the six chuck wagon teams and the community support made the event a success when it could have been a wash. She said residents Warren Frost and Bill Bruhn came to the aid of the event by providing school buses for people and judges to sit in during the event.

Reid said despite the weather, there was still a strong attendance from residents. She said ticket sales were down this year as the weather kept people from Clayton, Albuquerque and Santa Fe from attending the event.

She said the event, sponsored by the Canadian River Renegades, raises money for college scholarships for local students.

## Project gets no support

Commission unanimously opposes boreholes.

The Tucumcari City Commission added its voice to the rising chorus of opposition to a proposed borehole field test project at their April 25 meeting.

In a unanimous vote, commissioners voted to oppose the borehole project and, whether or not the borehole project would bring nuclear waste to Quay County, any plan that would result in nuclear waste being stored in the county.

The U.S. Department of Energy has been looking at the Nara Visa area to test boreholes as potential storage for smaller forms of nuclear waste, promising local residents that no actual waste will enter Quay County — a claim residents have not believed.

District 5 Commissioner Todd Duplantis did not attend the April 25 meeting.

The vote followed a discussion among commissioners and about 40 project opponents who packed the commission's chamber at Tucumcari City Hall.

Bart Wyatt, a rancher who lives in the Nara Visa area where the proposed project would take place, narrated a slide presentation in which he outlined the opposition's doubts about contractors' claims that the test borehole or other boreholes drilled in the same location will never host nuclear waste.

He cited the Quay County Commission's recent rescinding of a decision to support the project, and Logan School Superintendent Dennis Roch's statement of opposition. In addition, he said, opposition is rising in Union County, Harding County and Dalhart, Texas.

Nuclear waste contamination, he said, could spread through a 50-mile radius of a repository site in the "best

Wooley and Shirley Brinegar and their families to Tucumcari for this year's event," said Karen Alarcon, event founder and coordinator.

Alarcon said planning for the second annual Rawhide Days began shortly after the conclusion of last year's event. She said the overwhelming success of the inaugural event has pushed her and a dedicated group of volunteers to make this year's event even better.

Alarcon said several new activities have been added to the two-day event, including a blacksmith competition that will feature contestants from the area and across the country. case" scenario.  
 Earlier in the day, he said, he and other project opponents had talked to Tucumcari residents who live on Second and Third streets. Out of about 30 they talked with, only two failed to express opposition to the borehole project.

Robert Mills, another borehole opponent, said only two persons he contacted would not sign a petition opposing the borehole, because they

felt powerless to influence any government decision.  
 Wyatt pointed out what he believed to be contradictory statements made by the contractors, who insisted last winter that test boreholes in the Nara Visa area will not contain nuclear waste.  
 Recently, however, he said, the contractors have not been able to say unequivocally that waste will never be buried in Nara Visa.  
 In addition, he said, even with local opposition, the DOE could employ eminent domain to use a Nara Visa site to store nuclear waste. The DOE is facing fines of \$12 billion from states, because the department has missed deadlines for finding a permanent repository for nuclear waste, which, he said, means their urgency is grow-

ing.  
 District 1 Commissioner Ralph Moya said he had invited Mark Eckels, borehole project manager for Enercon Federal Services, Inc., to the April 25 meeting, but Eckels did not appear.  
 Moya also asked for a show of hands of audience members from Tucumcari who opposed the borehole project. About a dozen raised their hands.  
 Moya also said he would like to hear from more people with different viewpoints before making a decision.  
 When the commission voted to oppose the borehole project, Moya said he had to favor the side that spoke up to represent themselves.  
 District 4 Commissioner Robert Lumpkin, who proposed the resolution to

oppose the borehole, said that the non-Tucumcari residents who attended the April 25 meeting "shop here (in Tucumcari), see movies here and attend church here." He also said there is reason to doubt the claim that Nara Visa would never host a nuclear waste burial site.  
 District 2 Commissioner Amy Gutierrez said she voted to oppose the project because of the possibility nuclear waste could contaminate territory 50 miles from the site, and Tucumcari is about 40 miles from the site.  
 Mayor Ruth Ann Litchfield, who represents District 3, said she voted for the resolution, because "I know their (borehole opponents) concern for their children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren."



**Jesse Lee Wallace**

December 30, 1932 – April 26, 2017

Jesse Lee Wallace left this earthly existence, surrounded by family, on Wednesday, April 26, 2017, after a brief fight with cancer. Born to Waldemar Wendell and Susie Josephine Wallace on December 30, 1932, in Vega, Texas, Jess spent his early years traveling with his parents as they established one-room schoolhouses across the plains of Eastern New Mexico. Seeing the results of inadequate healthcare in these small communities had a profound effect on him and at an early age, Jess decided he would become a doctor. It was to be a natural calling and one that would touch thousands of lives over the course of his career.



After graduating from Tucumcari High School, Jess attended Eastern New Mexico University. College was interrupted by the conflict in Korea and he served in the Air Force as a radio operator with duty in Alaska and California. Returning to college he focused on biology and chemistry as his goal was to be accepted to a medical school.

While working towards two bachelor degrees, Jess met a music major around a ping-pong table on campus. That student, Katherine Gutierrez, became his wife on July 2, 1955 as they married in his mothers home in Tucumcari.

Jess was accepted to Baylor College of Medicine and soon the young couple found themselves in Houston, Texas and the rigors of medical school. Graduating from medical school in 1962 and finishing his residency in 1963, Jess and Kathy with two young children in tow returned to Tucumcari to begin medical practice. Two more children came along and a busy New Mexican life followed. It was during this time that Jess took up a life-long obsession that he loved and excelled at, and sometimes didn't golf. Some of his most cherished friendships were formed on the crucible of the tee box. The golf industry was extremely happy to have him as a sponsor.

The Wallace family moved to Utah in 1969 as Jess with partners Charlie Caton, Mack Davenport and Milo Andrus opened the first emergency room at St. Benedict's Hospital (now Ogden Regional Medical Center) in Ogden where he served as Chief of the Department until 1994. In 1982, Jess and his partners opened the NowCare clinics to help provide medical service to a burgeoning population. Jess retired from medicine in 1998. In retirement, Jess continued to enjoy golf, fishing, grandfatherhood, travel and playing guitar as Kathy accompanied on the piano.

Jess is survived by his wife, Katherine; four children and grandchildren: Renee and Paul Norris (Katee and Ali); Giles and Julie Wallace; Kelly Wallace; and Zane Wallace (Chase Stone).

He is preceded in death by his parents, Waldemar and Susie Wallace and his brother, Wendell.

A memorial service will be held to honor his life later in the year. In lieu of flowers donations may be made to the Humane Society of Utah or Best Friends Animal Sanctuary.

### Food worker deserves reward for suspect tip

If they aren't already in the process, the FBI, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, and U.S. Marshals Service should give the McDonald's worker — who identified the man wanted for gunning down a 74-year-old retiree and posting the murder on Facebook — the \$50,000 reward they offered for Steve Stephens' capture. Stephens killed himself after a brief chase.

The unnamed worker recognized Stephens last week as the wanted killer went through the fast-food restaurant's drive-thru in Erie, Pennsylvania, after ordering a 20-piece Chicken McNuggets and fries.

Two days earlier, Stephens had gunned down Robert Godwin Sr., a 74-year-old former foundry worker in Cleveland, then posted the chilling murder on Facebook.

Godwin, the father of 10 who was picking up aluminum cans when he was shot, is believed to have been a random victim. Stephens, 37, said in a Facebook video he was having trouble with his girlfriend and losing everything he had to gambling when he "just snapped."

The ensuing two-day multistate manhunt drew toward a conclusion when the McDonald's worker recognized Stephens and dialed 911 to report the suspect's location. A co-worker attempted to delay Stephens' departure by claiming they were waiting on his French fries, but Stephens drove quickly out of the parking lot, nearly colliding with another vehicle, according to police.

Police chased Stephens' car for about two miles before they spun his vehicle out with a squad car near an abandoned school. Seconds later, Stephens fatally shot himself.

Law enforcement officials said it was the McDonald's worker's tip that led them to Stephens.



They have worked hard. They come to community meetings armed with bookmarked reams of downloaded documents. They have walked the streets and knocked on doors.

While I think it's preposterous to believe the DOE would bury high-level nuclear waste under one of the nation's most important underground waterways, the Ogallala Aquifer, I can certainly understand the concerns of the Nara Visa area ranchers and residents.

They seem to be all too keenly aware they inhabit flyover country.

The DOE has the responsibility to find a place to store a few thousand tons of the deadliest waste material mankind has concocted but has done nothing to assure the flyover folks that they mean what they say about even a test borehole.

Why should the local residents not be suspicious about DOE's true intentions?

## Against the odds

□ A kidnapped trainer, an orphaned colt and the chance of a lifetime at the Derby.

Trainer Antonio Sano never expected to be here, having escaped Venezuela after being kidnapped twice.

The same can be said about a strapping foal who became an orphan shortly after his birth when his mother dropped dead.

Yet, here they are at the Kentucky Derby, looking to fulfill an impossible dream with improbable storylines.

Sano found the colt and bought Gunnevera for his clients for \$16,000, mere pennies in the horse industry.

But this tale began years before that.

Sano had acquired quite a reputation as a trainer in Venezuela. He got his first horse in 1988 and by the time he left 11 years later he had won 3,338 races and remains the country's all-time leading trainer.

But life on the backstretch is tough in Venezuela. A so-called "horse mafia" has been known to kidnap jockeys and in one case drug a beloved favorite to alter the outcome of a race.

Rio Negro, a heavy favorite in the Army Day Derby, was injected with a near-fatal dose of cortisone in order to compromise the horse's performance and allow those in the know to win more money on a shot that previously wasn't as long.

The Venezuelan Observatory of Violence says there are more than 40 kidnapping gangs in the country, some which work with police.

The first time Sano was kidnapped it was a low-grade "secuestro expreso," or "express kidnapping," where the victim is driven around the city and asked to empty out their bank accounts at as many ATMs as they can. He was captive only a couple hours.

But on July 23, 2009, seven armed men emerged from an SUV in front of his house at 5:30 a.m. They dragged him into the vehicle and sped away.

He was held for 36 days, most of them spent in a room with no window, no toilet and no running water. He was

shackled to the wall.

Sano's wife, Maria Christina, got as much money as she could, sold assets and called upon the kindness of relatives, horse owners, trainers, jockeys and even groomers.

He lost 40 pounds while in captivity and was hospitalized for 10 days upon his release.

Sano has never disclosed the ransom amount but colleagues put it at 700,000 Bolivars, which is about \$70,000.

Kidnapping "is very common," Sano said in an interview conducted in Spanish. "But I don't want to talk about it. For me, it's a very difficult story."

"There are a lot of problems in Venezuela. It's very dangerous right now. To see this happen to the country, it's very sad for me. I'm not going to go back."

Sano, now 54, never raced in Venezuela again. Maria Christina, an engineering professor, insisted it was time to move. They initially went to Italy, from where their families emigrated, but the horse racing industry there is in disarray.

Next stop was South Florida.

He saddled his first horse at Gulfstream on April 3, 2010. He had his first winner that same day.

His stable has grown to about 50 horses, one of them

called Gunnevera, named by co-owner Jamie Diaz Mengotti after a small town in Spain.

Pam and Jim Robinson, owners of Brandywine Farm in Paris, Ky., wanted to know more when they learned Dialed In, a winner of the Florida Derby, was going to stand stud at Darby Dan Farm, about a half-hour away in Lexington.

They bought two lifetime breeding rights to the stallion. Unbridled Rage was given one of those rights.

"She produced a big strong colt when she was 19," Pam Robinson said. "But she hemorrhaged shortly after delivering the foal. We got it under control within three days. She was completely normal."

"But when the foal was 10 days old, the mare died of a heart attack or an aneurism."

The people at Brandywine went into 24-hour-a-day triage, hand feeding the foal every hour. But, having humans raise a foal is not the best option.

"Orphan foals that end up hand raised are more likely to have behavioral issues, which is why people bring in nurse mares," said Camie Heleski, an expert in horse behavior and welfare, where she teaches in the University of Kentucky's equine program.

The controversial practice of nurse mares involves keep-

ing mares constantly pregnant so their milk can be available to Thoroughbred mares who have either rejected their foal or, in this case, died.

This is where Jenny, a paint, stepped in for Unbridled Rage.

Heleski says, in most cases, the mare's bond with the foal is extremely strong.

"But from a foal's perspective, I've seen a fair number of cases where hunger overrides the feeling of missing their mother," Heleski said. "The foal seems to take on a new mare with less resistance than a new mare taking on a new foal."

Robinson said the foal bonded quickly with Jenny.

"The horse needs to be raised as a horse, by a horse, not by a human," Robinson said.

Although she admits to a little bit of spoiling after his mother died.

"He was a friendly foal to begin with," Robinson said. "Everyone was hugging him. He was a big puppy dog for a couple of days."

When it was time to sell the horse as a yearling, expectations were high but reality stepped in. The colt sold for a meager \$16,000 at the 2015 Keeneland September Sale.

"We knew he was a nice

Logan Elementary students Lilly Nials and Payson Nials gave a presentation with various farm animals and how important the Earth is to their survival.

Mesalands Community College Farrier Science Instructor Paul Leonard and his students gave a demonstration of how to shoe a horse.

Nials said the children had a good response to all of the exhibits and speakers.

horse, nice foal, nice yearling," Robinson said. "It was extremely disappointing. But he was either the first or second horse in the ring near the end of the sale. Basically, there was nobody there. Everybody was late."

Sano, buying for Peacock Stables, happened to be on time that day.

"It was a heck of a bargain," Sano said. "Thank God, luck was on our side. It was a great deal."

Gunnvera ran his first race on June 10 at Gulfstream. He finished second. He broke his maiden in his third race about a month later.

He won his first stakes race, the Saratoga Special, in his next race after shipping to New York.

He finished fifth to Classic Empire the following race, the Breeders' Futurity Stakes at Keeneland, a points-bearing Kentucky Derby prep.

He bounced back with a win in the Delta Downs Jackpot, a race won the previous year by Exxagerator, winner of last year's Preakness.

He moved down to Gulfstream, where he finished second in the Holy Bull, won

the Fountain of Youth, and then took a game third in the Florida Derby.

Gulfstream has a very short run to the first turn, making it extremely difficult for slow-breaking horses on the outside to get into the race without great difficulty.

Gunnvera was in the 10 hole and jockey Javier Castellano made a quick angle to the rail.

Robinson, watching on television, called it "the hypotenuse of the triangle."

His late speed should make him one of the more popular horses as the Derby field of 20 stretches out to 1 1/4 miles for the first time.

Robinson doesn't plan to go to the race.

"We haven't been invited," Robinson said. "We'll watch on a nice big-screen TV with surround sound. Hopefully, we'll be up on our feet jumping up and down."

Sano will be nervously watching from the owner's box on the front stretch at Churchill Downs.

"This is the first time in my life that I'll have a horse in the Kentucky Derby," Sano said. "It's very emotional. It's everyone's goal...."

"This horse has a lot of heart."

Just like his trainer.

Meetings watch

Tucumcari City Commission

The Tucumcari City Commission took the following actions at their April 25 meeting in Tucumcari City Hall:

Authorized the city's Community Development Department to apply for a \$39,000 grant to the New Mexico Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department to fund Youth Conservation Corps activities, which hire several Tucumcari young adults every summer for specific projects. This year, YCC projects include improvements at Dunn Park and the Tucumcari Memorial Park Cemetery, said Mark Martinez, project manager. The city would match the grant with \$25,000 in in-kind services.

Authorized purchase of 15 Taser units for the city's police department. The units would replace current units that are in disrepair. The purchase agreement is with Axon Enterprises of Scottsdale, Arizona. The cost is \$18,537 to be paid over five years.

Authorized upgrades to the aviation fuel storage and piping system at Tucumcari Municipal Airport totaling \$160,000

in costs. All but \$16,000 will come from a grant from the New Mexico Department of Transportation, Aviation Division. City funds will cover the other \$16,000.

Approved agreements with Occam Engineering of Tucumcari for engineering services for sewer system improvements near the KOA campground near Route 66 and Interstate 40 and for water and sewer improvements on Mountain Road from Historic Route 66 Boulevard to I-40.

The city will pay \$19,957 for services involving the

KOA campground area and \$53,057 for services on the Mountain Road project.

Approved proposals from Gordon Environmental/PSC, a Bernalillo-based engineering firm, to monitor both the city's old and new waste landfills. The fees for the year are \$25,200 for the new landfill and \$19,500 for the old. The new landfill is located northeast of the city near U.S. 54. The old landfill is on Quay Road AP.

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## Group asks for borehole presentation

CLOVIS — A group looking to conduct a deep drilling experiment in Quay County explained Thursday night what it hoped to do over the next few months, should the project continue. Quay County residents came along with plenty of dissent, and every indication they wanted the project to end.

The High Plains Patriots' meeting at the Clovis-Carver Public Library covered the possible creation of a 5-kilometer-deep borehole.

High Plains Patriots President Carolyn Spence said the Patriots asked Enercon for a presentation after local media reported on the project.

"We're next-door neighbors," Spence told the crowd of about 70. "We want to be informed."

The session was moderated by Todd Hathorne, who frequently speaks at HPP meetings on various topics.

Atlanta-based Enercon and DOSECC Exploration Services of Salt Lake City were hired in December by the Department of Energy to study the feasibility of a deep borehole test in Nara Visa. The project includes five phases, and is in the first phase of public outreach.

Marc Eckels of Enercon said each phase ends with a decision on whether the next phase should happen.

The next four phases include drilling the boreholes at four different sites, narrowing the sites down to two, choosing a final site and then conducting experiments on emplacement technology.

Eckels said there wasn't much reference material for this type of borehole, because it goes into crystalline rock and granite while other drilling to such

depths largely goes into sedimentary rock. Only four other holes have been drilled as deep in the same surface, Eckels said — three in Europe and one in Asia.

"There aren't a lot of holes that deep in crystalline rock or granite," Eckels said. "There are so few of these holes in the world that we don't know enough about them to make broad generalizations."

Eckels said no nuclear waste will be disposed at the Quay County site, but many of the people in attendance with cardboard signs marked, "NO," didn't believe him.

Nobody in the forum audience spoke in favor of the project, but a few hands were raised when Hathorne asked for a show of hands to who supports the project. About half of the hands were raised when Hathorne asked who was against it, and a dozen or so hands raised to the category of wanting to learn more about the project.

Hathorne also asked if anybody believed "the nuclear genie was going back into the bottle," to which no hands raised. He noted that nuclear waste disposal will be a problem as long as there are nuclear weapons and nuclear power.

At the conclusion of the project, Eckels said the borehole would either be plugged, or repurposed into an observatory to possibly be used by Tucumcari's Mesalands Community College. Eckels said there is no deal in place with Mesalands, but the matter has been discussed "on a theoretical basis."

The Q&A session began with a format of written questions only, with one person per question, and later shifted to letting the person speak so the spirit of the question was voiced. At many points throughout the event, Hathorne reminded people if they were disruptive they would be asked to leave. Nobody's behavior escalated to that level.

Questions posed to Eckels included the following:

**■ Each meeting held on the project has had crowds with the majority opposing it; doesn't that prove the community doesn't support the project?** Eckels noted there was dissent, but said the city and county are made up of more than just the people attending the forums.

**■ Has Eckels ever worked with a project of this type?** He said he had not, and most of his deeper drilling experience came with oil and gas.

**■ Is density of population factored into DOE's location choices?** Eckels said it wasn't listed as a factor, but he thought it was a fair assumption lower population densities were attractive locations because the drilling would impact fewer people.

**■ Aren't resolutions against the borehole project by both the Tucumcari City Commission and Quay County Commission adequate in showing public disapproval?** Eckels said the evaluation process was still ongoing.

**■ Given there is a significant risk in transporting the material, doesn't it make more sense to store nuclear waste closer to where it's initially created?** Eckels thought that was a fair point, and, "there's a good chance that's ultimately what happens." He said the project could provide data that would help replicate similar boreholes elsewhere in the country.

Many questions, Hathorne said, were better answered by the Department of Energy instead of Eckels. Regarding those questions, Eckels said, the hope is to have a meeting in the summer in Tucumcari with the DOE attending.

## Don't let faith blow around like a cap in wind

By now, you probably don't remember those very windy days on March 23 and 24, especially because it's been pretty windy since then. Our grandson was out playing after school on March 23 and his cap blew off. He gave chase until he lost sight of it. We hoped it got caught in a woven-wire fence about 500 feet away, but he walked that fence line and it wasn't there. On March 24, the wind was even stronger and from the opposite direction. We shouldn't even consider ourselves saved if we don't do what Jesus said, either while he was on earth or through his inspired writers after he returned to God (John 14:25-26; 12:47-50; Luke 6:46; Matthew 7:21-27).

Second, many teachings today seem based in scripture, but they're actually contradictory to scripture (2

Corinthians 11:13-15; 2 Timothy 4:1-4; 2 Thessalonians 2:9-11). These can blow us about like a cap in the wind if we don't follow the Word and do what he says (Ephesians 2:11-16; 5:8-17).

Finally, as God sent the Word to accomplish his will for our good, Christians also are to spread our goodwill to all people to draw them to God, whether or not we know the outcome of our efforts (Luke 2:10-14; Galatians 6:7-10; Ecclesiastes 11:1-6; Proverbs 11:24; Luke 16:9; 1 Corinthians 3:5-9; James 4:17). # Borehole drilling hits grassroots opposition

There's an issue rising to the surface in New Mexico over some boreholes the Department of Energy wants to drill. A lot of people in some very rural areas are saying no.

It pertains to nuclear energy and the radioactive waste it creates. New Mexico is at the forefront of this waste-disposal issue with our very own Waste Isolation Pilot Plant, or WIPP — the only underground repository for nuclear waste in the nation — located just southeast of Carlsbad. Of course, it was sold as perfectly safe, but in 2014, we found out that, where humans are involved, there's always a

risk. A container was punctured, radiation escaped the underground facility and about a dozen above-ground workers were exposed to radiation.

Another possible approach that's been gaining traction in the industry is to store the waste about three miles underground. The radioactive waste could be lowered into boreholes, which would then be sealed and secured for the next 10,000 years or so.

The DOE is exploring this as we speak — and is looking at eastern and southern New Mexico as good places to drill the boreholes. The DOE, through some drilling contracts, is seeking to drill test

boreholes to determine the feasibility of this new approach to nuclear waste disposal.

Eastern New Mexico, and specifically Harding, Quay and Union counties are considered geologically ideal for this research, and since there aren't a lot of people living in this region, I suspect the DOE figured the opposition wouldn't be nearly as strong.

But the opposition in this region is loud and determined. All three of these counties' governing commissions have passed resolutions opposing the borehole "research" as have area water conservation districts and the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association — and at least one outspoken state lawmaker, Republican Sen. Pat Woods, who represents the area.

Their concerns are for the area's water supplies — including the Canadian River

Basin and the Ogallala Aquifer — and that unanticipated accidents could occur (see WIPP reference above). Opponents also see such the project as a threat to property values and agricultural production, and they don't want trucks with hazardous waste traveling their roadways.

The expressed purpose of the borehole test drilling is to collect data about the underground rock formations and water reservoirs to determine whether this disposal method would be doable. The DOE has hired Atlanta-based Enercon and DOSECC

Exploration Services of Salt Lake City to do the testing on land that's southwest of Nara Visa in northern Quay County — just a few miles from Union and Harding counties and the Texas state line.

It's one of the most sparsely populated areas in New Mexico, which makes the numbers turning out in opposition all the more impressive. Thomas Garcia of the Quay County Sun reported that at a commission meeting in early April, more than 150 people turned out to express their opposition. And Cydni Wyatt reported in the Harding County Roundup — a paper produced by a Mosquero High School class to keep locals informed — wrote that 70-plus people turned out for an informational meeting in Roy, also in early April.

"The meeting ended in a show of hands," Wyatt wrote in the Roundup. "No meeting

attendee raised their hand in support of the project."

In a town of 234 people, in a county of about 695 people (2010 census data), that's quite a turnout.

This grassroots opposition is clearly being heard. The Quay County Commission and the Logan Municipal Schools district each initially supported the borehole project — until they heard from their constituents. They've since rescinded their support and are now on record opposing the project.

Meanwhile, a similar project is being considered in Otero County where opposition is taking hold as well. As of this writing, the chair of the Otero County Commission, Janet White, has proposed a resolution opposing the boreholes, even if they are just for testing. And in other states, including communities in the Texas Panhandle and in South Dakota, there's resistance as well.

Under the Obama administration, DOE officials said the borehole projects needed community support to move forward; a lack of such support killed one proposed project in Spink County, South Dakota. Proponents are quick to point out that no radioactive waste will be deposited at the locations where the testing occurs, but no one appears to be buying that. After all, why would they be test-drilling boreholes in those areas if they weren't interested in those areas for the permanent disposal sites?

For now, it seems the people are being heard — at least by their local government representatives. The question is, under our new president's administration, is the DOE going to listen? Time will tell.


