

Local places top-10 in rodeo finals

Mesalands Community College's bullrider tied for eighth place last week at the 69th Annual College National Finals Rodeo in Casper, Wyoming.

Kenneth "Blue" Wilcox from Greenbrier, Arizona, started the college national finals on a high note after being crowned the bull riding champion for the Grand Canyon Region in the year-end standings, according to Intercollegiate Rodeo Coach Matt Hughes.

Wilcox earned 75.5 points in the second round of the bull riding event and qualified for the championship round. He then received a no score in the championship round and tied for eighth place at the college finals.

Scotty Bevins from Amsterdam, New York, finished in the top 25 in the bareback riding event for Mesalands with an average of 180.5 points. Bevins ended the rodeo in 21st place at the college national finals.

The Mesalands Community College Rodeo Team will host their 10th Annual Mesalands Intercollegiate Fall Rodeo in October at the Quay County Rodeo Arena.

Portales next leg of water project

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PORTELES — Eastern New Mexico Water Utility Authority board members voted Friday that the water pipeline to Portales will be the next phase of the Ute water pipeline project.

ENMWUA Executive Director Justin Howalt told board members the water authority needed direction on which phase to work on next from Cannon Air Force Base, whether it be the pipeline to Clovis, the one to Melrose and Grady or the one to Portales.

Board member David Lansford suggested the Portales pipeline be the next phase, because Portales city officials and councilors have expressed concerns about getting a return investment on money they are putting into the project.

Board members Sharon King and Jim Lucero, who both sit on the Portales City Council, said they believed it would put city councilors' minds at ease to know the pipeline to Portales was being built first.

Portales City Manager Sammy Standerfer also agreed it would set councilors' minds at ease, saying he has had

multiple councilors express concerns to him about Portales getting any benefit from the project any time in the near future.

Board members also approved extending several current contracts through December with plans to renew them for a year at their December meeting. The contracts were with Capital Consultants, Thompson Consulting, CH2MHILL, Hinkle + Landers, attorney David Richards, Rex Stall and RBC Capital Markets.

Lansford suggested only extending the contracts for the time being rather than renewing them for a year, because it would be a disservice to new, incoming board members to approve expenses that they will be dealing with once in office. Fellow board members agreed.

Board members also approved contracts with Canadian River Soil & Water Conservation District and NV5 with King voting against the contracts.

The contract with CRSWCD is a grant agreement to complete some work with the Environmental Protection Agency on the watershed management plan, according to Howalt.

Howalt said they are contracting with NV5 for the

services, but they will send the bill for the services to the CRSWCD, which has a contract with the EPA for providing such services.

King said she did not agree that ENMWUA should be in the middle of the contracts, and CRSWCD should just contract with NV5 directly and leave the water authority out of it.

"It's not our grant," said King. "Why are we subcontracting to subcontract someone that just happens to work with us when that subcontractor has their own business?"

Howalt said the ENMWUA helped pay for and develop the water management plan initially, and EPA prefers they be part of the contract process.

"Once the watershed management plan was adopted and approved by the environment department and the EPA, they (CRSWCD) were going to try to go get grants based off the watershed management plan to be able to go out and maintain the water shed," he said.

King said she still does not believe the water authority having been part of the development justifies them being the fiscal agent for NV5 with CRSWCD.

Chairwoman Gayla Brumfield and board member

Wendel Bostwick were both thanked by several contracted officials and fellow board members for their services to the water pipeline project on Friday.

The meeting was the last for Brumfield and Bostwick who have both served on the ENMWUA board for several years — Brumfield for almost a decade.

"The main reason that she has worked so hard on this is ... she loves Clovis to the nth degree ... and the other is she loves water issues," King said of Brumfield at the end of the meeting. "I know I'm biased because she is my best friend, but I think she has just given her all to this water issue and to the authority and to the city of Clovis. I think we all have a lot to owe her for where she has gotten us."

Brumfield thanked everyone for being such a great team and told them to "keep the faith" and never say the project won't happen, because it will; it has to happen.

The following were reports given during the meeting:

■ CH2MHILL representative Wendy Christofferson told board members that her company has sent 19 second offer letters in regard to appraisals done for easements. She said they just received four new appraisals for the Portales piece of the pipeline and have sent initial offer letters for them, and there are four appraisals pending.

"We've mostly been focused on pushing towards the finish for our two segments, which is the alignment that goes to Cannon and Clovis," she said. "We do need to now focus again ... to get the easement down north and south on the west side of Cannon Air Force Base, so we'll be pushing on that."

■ Howalt reported that ENMWUA should be closing on its 2015-16 financial awards from the Water Trust Board soon, so he hopes to meet the schedule of going out to bid on the next project phases this summer.

Moya, Gutierrez and Litchfield were all up for recall due to a petition started by Tucumcari resident Keith Hayes.

"I appreciate all those who came out to vote and (I) congratulate the commissioners on their victory," Hayes said, adding that he hopes this will help the commission to govern Tucumcari the way it should be, working on viable issues, not cosmetic ones. Although Hayes cited his reason for starting the petitions as commissioners not putting the needs of residents first, he has battled commissioners regarding being fined for his business property being unkempt.

She said working with the coach and doing more events gave her more confidence with competing this year.

Taylor, whose platform is "The Silent Cry: Suicide prevention and awareness", said she is passionate about suicide awareness because her brother, Nathan, committed suicide at 41 years old.

"I hope to keep other people from doing that. I know I can't save everyone, so the people who do commit suicide, I hope to build up their families."

Taylor said one of her favorite memories with her brother is when she was little, and he brought some bicycles in with her dad for Christmas.

"His daughter (Nathan's) and me were around the same age, and we just got to ride our bikes around the living room," she said.

Taylor said she wants teens and young adults to know that "they are special no matter what, and you have so much ahead of you in your life, and the hard times aren't

always going to last."

Eastern New Mexico's Outstanding Teen Tamara McSmith's platform for drug and alcohol abuse awareness also hits close to home.

For her talent, McSmith gave a monologue about her mother, who died about a year ago from drug and alcohol abuse.

"I decided to write a monologue about her," she said. "It talked about the memories and the things we did, and that there are consequences to drug and alcohol abuse."

McSmith, 13, of Nara Visa, said she wanted to try the pageant to overcome her shyness and fear of being on stage in front of people, and it gave her more courage.

"I have enjoyed it. The girls are very nice, and every one of them deserves where they are. It's a very good experience. You learn not to be so stressed out about going up in front of people. It gives you more courage to do things," she said.

symptoms will improve when you get out of the heat or drink water. However, if you don't see improvement within 30 minutes, you need to go to the ER for evaluation and treatment.

Wallace said it is important to check on the elderly, especially those without air-conditioning. She said it is also important to remember to never leave children in vehicles even if it is for just a few minutes.

While state and federal websites advise for heat precautions for the young, elderly and residents with underlying health conditions, there is another group in need of care during high temperatures.

It is very important to make sure your animals have plenty of water, shade and if possible, a body of water to help keep them cool, said Jean P. Corey, veterinarian.

Corey said even the animals inside the house can suffer from heat related issues if proper precautions are not taken. She said the temperature needs to be monitored inside the home, especially in mobile homes. Mobile homes do not have as much insulation to protect animals from the heat, Corey added.

conditioning, choose places you can go for relief from the heat during the warmest part of the day, such as schools, libraries, theaters and malls.

■ Discuss heat safety precautions with members of your household. Have a plan for wherever you spend timeS — home, work and schoolS — and prepare for power outages.

■ Check the contents of your emergency disaster kit in case a power outage occurs.

■ Know those in your neighborhood who are elderly, young, sick or overweight. They are more likely to become victims of excessive heat and may need help.

Profaning the Lord's Name?

Dear brother Clem: What does the Bible say about profaning the Lord's name? What of the habit of some people exclaiming, "Lord, have mercy," or just saying, "Good Lord"? — T.H., GA

Let us see some commands regarding this: "And ye shall not swear by my name falsely, and profane the name of thy God" (Lev. 21:6). "And that they profane not my holy name: I am Jehovah" (Lev. 22:2). "But refuse profane and old wives' fables. And exercise thyself unto godliness" (1 Tim. 4:7). "But shun profane babblings: for they will proceed further in ungodliness" (2 Tim. 2:16).

The verb "profane," means "to make common or unholy to desecrate, to pollute." To profane the name of the Lord, then, is to use His name in a way that is common or degrading or unholy. And surely, not just proper names such as Jesus or Jehovah is meant. To Profane "Christ" or "God" or "the Lord" would be just as bad.

The use of the Lord's name in "by-words" or in slang expressions is profaning His name. The use of the Lord's name in a casual or flippant way also profanes His name. And to casually say, "Lord, have mercy" is profaning His name, unless we really mean it. The Lord is good, but to make a thoughtless habit of saying, "Good Lord," would be profane. When we use the name of the Lord, it should be with reverence and sincerity.

It is very easy to fall into the habit of using the Lord's name (or the equivalent thereof) in a thoughtless way that profanes it. For instance, a friend of mine once preached a sermon on the use of "by-words." He pointed out that "golly" was derivative of "God Almighty," that "gee" was derived from "Jesus" and so forth. Then, thinking of another point, he said, "Oh, by the way...." I later asked him if he had read John 14:6, where Jesus said, "I am the way?" I never got an answer. It is difficult to be consistent in all things. But we should try. And the habit of such slang expressions should be broken. All of us would be better for it.



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Pearce recounts shooting details

□ Representative says he noticed a man who seemed 'a little out of place.'

Steve Pearce was just stepping in to take batting practice Wednesday morning when he noticed a man who seemed "a little out of place."

While everyone else at the U.S. House Republican baseball team practice was engaged in their workout or watching the players, Pearce said the man who appeared near the third-base dugout was looking around the field at nothing in particular.

And then he raised a rifle and began firing.

Authorities said four peo-

ple were shot in the minutes that followed. The shooter, identified as James Hodgkinson, 66, of Belleville, Illinois, was killed by police.

Pearce said his most prominent thought was trying to figure out how to help, but he didn't know how.

"The security detail were telling us to get cover and get away but the people out on the field didn't have the value of that," Pearce said in a telephone conference call with reporters on Wednesday afternoon.

He said he witnessed the shooter aim for Rep. Trent Kelly of Mississippi and

miss before shooting Rep. Steve Scalise in the hip.

Scalise, who is from Louisiana, was listed in critical condition on Wednesday afternoon.

Pearce said one shooting victim "stepped out right where I had been and then was shot. He went down and crawled for cover."

Pearce was in eastern New Mexico late last month before returning to the Washington, D.C., area.

The shooting happened in the Washington suburb of Alexandria, Virginia.

"We know that we are in the congressional office and that we're very visible," said Pearce.

"But to see the young staffers gunned down, it just breaks your heart."

Pearce said the act does not change his opinion on gun control because it is not an issue of policy, it is an issue of division within the country.

"We see people do this with machetes, we see people do this with cars; the problem is not with weapons, it is one with heart," Pearce said.

He said Republicans and Democrats met after the shooting and agreed the proper response to the tragedy is togetherness.

"For all the noise and all the fury, we are one family," said Speaker Paul Ryan, addressing the chamber.

Pearce said this could be a turning point for the country.

"These are the points in our nation's history where

we really prove who we are and what we're about," he said.

"This doesn't change my political outlook at all. I will

keep working with people across political divisions and I think that is the answer for our state and the answer for our country."

Study: Poverty still grips state

A national study of family and child well-being has found that New Mexico ranks second to last behind Mississippi, and Curry and Roosevelt County are not faring much better than the average.

The survey also found that neither parent in 11.4 percent (22,659) of New Mexico families were employed in 2015. It showed 14.2 percent (888) of Curry County families and 8.5 percent (187) of Roosevelt County families had unemployed parents.

Portales' Dolores Penrod was the director of the Portales Community Services Center from 1965-1999, and in that time familiarized herself with area demographics. Since then, she said, children have quickly become the poorest group of people in the nation.

"Now that we have Social Security for the elderly, the elderly are no longer the poorest people in the country. It's little children, and of course a lot of the poverty that we have for little children has to do with single mothers," she said.

Penrod attributed the high poverty rates to income disparity.

"We have a lot of people earning a very low average weekly wage. It's essentially that we don't have many people with middle-class incomes. If you include college faculty and other incomes, there's quite a gap between those salaries when you get down to it," she said.

Underemployment, too, keeps people below the poverty line, Penrod said.

"Most people are underemployed, just working part-time jobs, and frequently patching together several part-time jobs in order to make ends meet," she said.

Through it all, however, the people of eastern New Mexico manage to scrape by, she said.

"On what their meager income is, they manage to survive. Also, that explains why, even though we're quite poor, we don't have homeless people. It's because we have people who take people in. You have to understand the culture and demographics," she said.

"I've been with the

Bible outlaws all 'soft socialism'

I've seen people on social media claiming the Bible doesn't bother to advocate any particular economic order. Supposedly, if a nation chooses capitalism, socialism, or any other "ism," we shouldn't imagine that God cares one way or the other.

This assertion is one fruit of a sort of Christian preaching that fails to apply the Word of God to every area of life, in favor of focusing exclusively on the warm fuzzies you have in your heart because of Jesus.

Don't get me wrong: I'm all for warm fuzzies, but the Bible is about more than

that. In fact, the Scripture assumes free markets, and that is practically the only economic arrangement we see in action throughout its narratives. We see private individuals engaged in open, unhindered trade, buying and selling their own possessions, free from government interference.

There are a couple of odd exceptions, but we'll save those for later articles, as they do nothing to argue with this thesis.

For now, it's important to note that the Bible outlaws all forms of mandatory collectivism, including the

"soft socialism" that we live with today. It does this with one, simple commandment: the Eighth. "Thou shalt not steal." (Exodus 20:15)

How does the Eighth Commandment outlaw socialism? By establishing a right to private property.

You can't steal from your neighbor unless he actually owns stuff. Contrarily, col-

lectivist theories (including our homegrown socialism) assume government ownership of all money and means of production.

The government may let you keep some stuff (and thanks be to government) but in a pinch, it just passes a new law and confiscates it.

Am I exaggerating? Try not paying your property taxes on that home that you "own," and you will eventually be shown in no uncertain terms who actually owns it.

But God has said, "Thou shalt not steal." Now, you wouldn't know it from lis-

tening to many modern pulpits, or the 24-hour news channels, but this is also talking about government. The king wasn't allowed to break the laws that you and I have to keep. (See for instance the rules for kings in Deuteronomy 17:14-20.)

Government can't do immoral things just because it is the government, including immoral things like thieving.

where the founders thought our rights come from, and what the job of the government is regarding those rights.

Government should preserve God-given liberties, not destroy them.

Socialism can't happen without theft and coercion through threat of unjust violence. It is therefore anti-God and should get no hearing among us.


Tickets for the June 22

The fishing report has been generated from the best information available from Department of Game and Fish officers and anglers. Conditions encountered after the report is compiled may differ, however, as stream, lake and weather conditions alter fish and angler activities.

Blue Hole Park Pond: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Clayton Lake: Fishing was good using assorted PowerBait, worms and Fire Balls for rainbow trout. Fishing was fair to good using spoons and crank baits for largemouth bass. We had no other reports. Due to low water conditions, the boat ramp remains closed.

Conchas Lake: Fishing was good using Texas-rigged finesse worms, tubes, Senkos, jigs, jerk baits, crank baits, creature baits, curly

tail grubs and top water lures for largemouth bass and smallmouth bass. Fishing was fair to good using tubes and crank baits for white bass. Fishing was fair using jig and minnow combinations, spinner minnow combinations, leeches, curly tail grubs and crank baits for walleye. We had no other reports.

Oasis Park Lake: Fishing was fair to good using worms, homemade dough bait and blood baits for channel catfish up to 6 pounds. We had no other reports.

Santa Rosa Lake: Fishing was good using plastic worms, Senkos, swim baits, jerk baits, buzz baits, crank baits, live crawdads, live worms and pink grubs for largemouth bass and smallmouth bass. Anglers fishing with live bait also caught a few bluegill and crappie. Fishing was fair to good using minnows, curly tail grubs and crank baits for walleye. We had no other

reports. A water release is expected to begin on June 16 and run for 15 days.

Sumner Lake: Fishing was good using curly tail grubs, crank baits, bottom bouncer night crawler rigs and jig and minnow combinations for walleye. Fishing was good using crank baits, jerk baits, tubes, worms, creature baits and Senkos for smallmouth bass and largemouth bass. Fishing was fair to good using crank baits, grubs and minnows for white bass. Fishing for crappie was slow to fair for anglers using minnows, small grubs and tubes. Fishing at the upper end of the lake was good using cut bait and liver for catfish. We had no other reports. A water release is scheduled to begin June 19 and run for 15 days.

Ute Lake: Fishing for smallmouth bass and largemouth bass was good using Ricos, buzz baits, Senkos, tubes, curly tail grubs, finesse worms and grubs.

The top water lures worked best in the early morning hours. Fishing for white bass was fair trolling crank baits near the trees in 15 to 18 feet of water. Fishing for walleye was slow but a few were caught by anglers using jigs, Ben rigs and leeches. Fishing for bluegill was good using worms under a bobber and small plastics. Fishing for crappie and catfish was slow. The surface water temp was in the low 70s.

CLOVIS — New Mexico's American Veterans, AMVETS, are gathering in Clovis for their annual state convention this weekend.

Posts from Albuquerque, Farmington, Shiprock, and Deming are scheduled to be here to discuss and vote on national matters as well as vote in new leaders for the state posts.

Post 14 in Clovis is the AMVET state hub because

no other branch in New Mexico has an official AMVET post building to meet in, organizers said.

Commander Tommy Knight said he expects there to be 40 representatives from across the state. He looks forward to reconnecting with other members and making progress in the AMVET mission, which is to serve veterans and their communities.

Knight holds leadership roles at the local, state and district levels and is aiming to be elected as second vice commander of the national AMVET post.

"It's near and dear to my heart to help people and get things done," Knight said.

AMVETS have numerous programs to serve veterans and their families including employment assistance, veter-

ans with disabilities services, and assisting homeless vets through the Freedom Foundation.

Knight said the Clovis area sees more than 80 homeless veterans each year. In 2016, the post assisted 21 veterans in securing housing. So far this year, 11 veterans have secured places to live through the help of AMVETS he said.

AMVETS in the area also provide educational materials to ROTC programs for high school students to learn more about all military branches.

Through this program, students receive scholarships to travel to Virginia and the District of Columbia to study American and military history Knight said.

"Anything to do with veter-

ans in the community, we're involved," he said.

In addition to official business, organizers of the AMVETS Convention will award Brenda Forrest, "AMVET of the Year" and recognize Jack Apfelbacher for his 30 years as the commander of the Deming post.

According to Knight, Forrest has gone above and beyond the call of duty to start Post 1944 in Farmington. She holds fundraisers to assist homeless veterans in the San Juan county area and acquired a warehouse to stock materials necessary to continue assistance. Forrest has also been working on refurbishing memorials and drives vets from Farmington to the veterans hospital in Albuquerque.
