Recall process could change

□ The rules in Raton, Tucumcari are lax, says Rep. Dennis Roch.

In the upcoming session of the New Mexico legislature, Rep. Dennis Roch will push for an amendment to the statute that governs the election recall process for manager/commission forms of government.

Roch said the change to the law would affect the manager/commission-type of government like those

seen in the city commissions in Tucumcari, Raton and Clayton. He said in that form of government, the rules to recall a commissioner are lax.

Roch said under state statute 3-14-16, a commissioner could be recalled for simply not being liked. He said someone might not like a decision made by a commissioner and start a petition to have them recalled. There could be no issue of wrongdoing, but if they get 20 percent of the voters in the last election to sign the petition, they are granted a recall election.

"A recall election could cost the city between \$6,000 and \$11,000," said Jared Langenegger, Tucumcari city manager.

The last recall election took place was on Jan. 2, 2014, and cost approximately \$6,000 to \$6,500, said Angelica Gray, city clerk.

Gray said the special election was for the recall of Jimmy Sandoval, the District 2 commissioner, and Dora Salinas McTigue, the District 1 commissioner. She said Sandoval was recalled and McTigue kept her commission seat.

Gray said after a recall election, the commission has two options to fill the vacant commission seat. She said the commission can appoint a new commissioner, or if they can not agree on who to appoint, another election is held to fill the position. The commission appointed Amy

Base realignment discussed at forum

Area legislators discussed the forecast of the 2017 budget, capital outlay and business regulations on Dec. 6 during a legislative forum at Mesalands Dinosaur Museum and Natural Science Laboratory.

Sen. Pat Woods and Rep. Dennis Roch spoke with residents at the forum organized by the Eastern Plains Council of Governments.

Woods represents District 7 (Curry, Quay and Union counties). Roch represents District 67 (Quay, Harding, Union, Curry, Roosevelt, San Miguel and Colfax counties).

One issue centered around the possibility of base realignment and closures of military base and national laboratories in New Mexico once President-elect Donald Trump's administration takes over.

Woods said for one, Canon Air Force Base in Clovis, is operating in the best positions it could in the entire U.S.

Roch said not only does Canon have such a specialized mission, Holloman Air Force Base recently had two additional F-16 training squadrons relocated there. The two squadrons will be used in the new Formal Training Unit. The Air Force will move the F-16s

from Hill Air Force Base in Utah, shortfall, at what point do you as a legislator or the legislature look at tapping into the Land Grant Permanent Fund?"



City stands by pay decisions**By Steve Hansen**

City commissioners and City Manager Jared Langenegger have joined employers in feeling confused about recent federal actions regarding overtime pay.

At a public workshop held before the Thursday city commission meeting, the commissioners seemed to agree that the city should not take back some pay decisions made between

approval of new U.S. Department of Labor regulations and the federal appeals court decision that overturned the DOL regulations.

The commission cannot take action at workshop sessions, but commissioners agreed to put the pay decisions on the agenda for this week's city commission meeting.

Under the new regulations applied to the October federal Fair Labor Standards Act, employees

who earn less than \$47,000 per year cannot be considered salary employees; they must be paid on an hourly basis.

Langenegger said some employees, who had been on salary and would find themselves paid on an hourly basis, balked at moving to hourly pay, despite the opportunity to earn more per hour on overtime.

"They like the flexibility they have now," he said. "They don't want to be sub-

jected to regular hourly schedules."

Mayor Pro Tem Robert Lumpkin proposed to give these employees a choice between going hourly or staying on salary.

Other employees, however, have been promised pay raises to comply with the rule, Langenegger said, and he would not be inclined to scale employees back in their pay in response to the court ruling.

Other commissioners agreed.

Water line expansion approved**By Steve Hansen**

The Tucumcari City Commission cleared the way Thursday for a new "cell" at the city's landfill and part of a water line that will allow business expansion at Interstate 40 and Mountain Road.

The commission named Sierra Valley Contractors, LLC, of Truth or Consequences to build the new section for the landfill. Sierra Valley was the low bidder with a price of \$429,210, according to the bid summary submitted by project engineer Gordon Environmental PSC.

City Manager Jared Langenegger said the project

should be completed by March or April 2017, when the second cell of the landfill — which is currently in use — reaches capacity.

The commission also approved a bid of \$53,000 from Occam Engineering to design a stretch of new 10-inch water line between Rock Island Street and Mountain Road, which will connect to a stretch of 10-inch line being built from the Flying J Travel Center at Mountain Road and I-40 to a point north of Historic Route 66 along Mountain Road.

The 10-inch water lines will replace 6-inch lines currently in use and allow capacity for the new Fairfield Inn under construction next to Flying J and

accommodate additional business development in that area, Langenegger said.

Tucumcari Municipal Airport will also have more runway space in about 60 days, after the commission approved a bid from R.L. Reeder, a Santa Fe paving contractor, to construct the runway. The successful bid was for a little more than \$350,000, with the Federal Aviation Administration picking up 90 percent of the tab. The other 10 percent, about \$35,000, will be split between the New Mexico Department of Transportation and the city, said Ralph Lopez, a city community development project manager.

The commission also

approved a \$10,000 reduction in contract services from the state Non-Metro Area Agency on Aging for operation of the Tucumcari Senior Center.

Mary Ann Dominguez, director of the senior center, said the reduction was necessary due to state budget cuts. The contract was reduced from \$230,310 to \$219,598.

The Tucumcari Police Department received authorization to seek grants from state anti-Driving While Intoxicated funds. One is for \$5,618 to fund saturation patrols during the 100 Days of Summer, ENDWI and the Buckle-Up campaign. The other is for \$1,166 for public information and education about DWI programs.

Langenegger said along with the cost of holding a recall election, there are several issues that affect the city and the commission. He said a recall could divide the commission and disrupt the operations of the city.

"Instead of focusing on passing an ordinance that helps to move the city forward, the commissioners are worried about being recalled," Langenegger said.

Langenegger said a recall

election also affects the duties of the city clerk, who now has to focus on the recall election instead of working on bids and contracts, requests for proposals and purchases.

"I'm going to try to change that law to be more like the recall rules followed by Albuquerque and Santa Fe city commissions," Roch said.

Roch said in Albuquerque and Santa Fe, in order for a recall to occur, the petition for the recall is reviewed by a judge. He said if the judge finds that there is an issue or

evidence of malfeasance by the commissioner, they will approve a recall.

"There has to be an actual instance of malfeasance," Roch said. "The recall is not granted simply because someone does not agree with the commissioner or the way they voted on an ordinance."

Roch said this issue was brought to his attention by several communities in his district, including Tucumcari. He said the main goal is to prevent city governments from having to pay for a recall election that is not warranted.

City gets grant for wastewater plan

The City of Tucumcari received a \$30,000 grant for their wastewater planning efforts from the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The \$30,000 grant will be used for an engineering and environmental study into the possibility of converting the city's wastewater treatment plant to 100 percent reuse, said City Manager Jared Langenegger.

Tucumcari was among three New Mexico communities to receive the wastewater planning grants, according to a release from Terry Brunner, USDA rural development state director.

Langenegger said the plant works to ensure that it meets the effluent guide-

lines that are national regulatory standards of the Environmental Protection Agency. He said all treatment facilities must meet certain standards before discharging to water bodies or land, or reused.

Langenegger said the city would save money by converting the plant to 100 percent reuse. He said the city has partnered with the New Mexico State University's Agricultural Science station in the past to conduct wastewater reuse research.

Converting the plant to 100 percent reuse could further benefit that partnership and others developed in

the future.

The funds were made available through USDA Rural Development's Rural Utility Service Water and Wastewater Search Grant program, which funds studies and plans for system improvements.

"The communities we funded today are working to build sustainability in their water and wastewater systems, and we are happy to partner with them," Brunner said.

"In New Mexico, protection of water is paramount and solid planning behind that resource is imperative to our rural communities."

in real trouble."

Woods said he would not and does not condone tapping into the permanent fund. He said there are other options that need to be explored, including seeking federal funding for programs and attracting businesses to the state.

"Another approach to reversing the state's revenue downturn that legislators need to avoid is raising taxes," Roch said. "I'm not alone in the thought that we already pay plenty in taxes."

Roch said New Mexico needs to stay economically competitive with its neighbors in an effort to draw businesses into the state. He said the last thing the state needs to do is raise taxes and make the economic climate less viable for businesses to thrive.

"There will be a push in the senate to pass legislation to raise taxes, but that is not the answer," Woods said.

Woods said legislators have to work together for the good of the entire state to get the budget in order. He said instead of raising taxes, there needs to be a push to draw in new businesses to diversify the revenue generated by the state.

Woods said there are so many possibilities with New Mexico's natural resources that warrant exploration. He said with oil and gas, New Mexico could make plastics.

Woods said we have to remain competitive and offer incentives for businesses to come into the state.

Roch said when revenues get short, whether at the state, business or in a family, you make a decision

about how to spend money.

"This is exactly how it felt when I first entered the legislature eight years ago," Roch said. "Revenues were down, and we had to make decisions on what departments and programs would have its funding cut."

Roch said first you must focus on essential services, things you need to have and pause on things nice to have.

"As state legislators, we must decide what they are going to spend their restricted budget on," Roch said. "Things like education, public safety and ensure that we take care of the children and our most vulnerable citizens."

Woods said it's going to be difficult, but we need to be stricter with our spending while ensuring not to take away from education funding.

"Our children's education is vital to our state's future," Woods.

Woods said a vital area the state needs to look at in the education field is the employment of teachers for K-12 schools. He said these are some of the most important jobs in the state. There is such a high expectation for teachers to succeed, yet we can't pay them what we should, he said of New Mexico.

"These are the people who will teach our children," Woods said. "We need the best and brightest to help mold our future."

Roch said there will be a shortage in capital outlay distributions but not because there is not a capacity. He said capital outlay funds do not come from the general funds. The capital outlay funds come from severance taxes that are paid when natural resources, such as oil, gas or copper, are extracted from the ground, he added.

Roch said even though there will be severance taxes brought in this year, the legislature in hard times swap those funds to avoid spending money from the general fund. He said while this prevents cuts for a moment, it reduces the severance tax pool money to help fund the projects needed by communities.

"I do not think there will be any capital outlay funds available," Woods said. "Not to put an even grimmer outlook on things, but the funds won't be available."

What Constitutes Worship?

Dear brother Clem: Some have taught that in order to worship we must eat the Lord's Supper, sing, teach, pray and contribute. That all of these must be done for it to constitute acceptable worship. Others say that every thing we do in service to God is worship. Would you please explain what constitutes worship? -F.H., TN"

Webster defines the verb, worship: "to adore, to pay divine honors to, to show reverence by performing acts adoration." The use of "worship" in the Scriptures shows the same basic meaning. When Abraham went up the mountain to offer Issac as a sacrifice, he called it worship (Gen. 22:5). When his servant, on his errand to find a wife for Issac, came to the house of Rebekah's family, "The man bowed his head, and worshipped Jehovah" (Gen. 24:26). Thus a prayer of praise was worship. Those that were crucifying Jesus sought to humiliate and degrade him, "And they smote his head with a reed, and spat upon him, and bowing their knees worshipped him" (Mark 15:19). They did it with mockery, but it was still called "worship." Thus, each of those acts in the question is worship, whether we do all of them or just one or two. When one praises God in song, that is worship. Prayer is worship, etc.

By definition, any "act of homage to God" is worship. That is, any act that has as its direct purpose to honor God. An act of kindness to a needy person is an act of service to God, but its primary purpose is to help that individual; thus, that act is not worship. We may run a business, work at a job, go to school, play at some sport—all of these things can involve our service to God. But they are not worship, because the primary purpose of them is not to glorify God. The end result may glorify Him, but the act itself is not designed to Glorify Him. So, not everything we do in life is worship. All of our "good works" may bring glory to God as an end result, but such works are not worship. That is, they are not done for the primary purpose of glorifying God.



Constitution shouldn't be easily changed

Although the state Legislature's 60-day session doesn't begin for another seven weeks, some legislators are already talking about trying to amend the state Constitution.

It's not because of some glaring deficiency in the venerable document, but to circumvent the legislative process, as well as Gov. Susana Martinez's ability to veto their pet pieces of proposed legislation.

That's not only an abuse of the process, it can help to exacerbate the bitter partisanship that fuels legislative gridlock.

There are proper times and reasons to amend the state Constitution, such as the amendment to revamp the jail bond system that voters just overwhelmingly approved. Eighty-seven percent of the voters who cast a ballot on the amendment apparently agreed that the justice system was allowing too many violent criminals to bail out of jail and create more mayhem, and sought to put a stop to it.

But now there's already talk about submitting constitutional amendments to voters on issues ranging from raising the state's minimum wage to legalizing recreational marijuana use to creating an ethics commission — all measures that bogged down in the previous legislative sessions without ever reaching the governor's desk.

Albuquerque Republican Rep. Jim Dines' limited bill to amend the state Constitution to create a nine-member ethics commission that would oversee the legislative and executive branches, contractors and lobbyists is a legitimate proposal and an example of the type of issue that would make sense as part of the state's document of fundamental principles of government.

But regardless of their popularity, neither the ever-changing minimum amount of pay a business is required to provide nor a decision to ignore federal law so that people in the state can get high with less worry about being arrested rise to the level of constitutional concern. They are issues of the day that can be addressed through legislation, if the support is there for passage.

But that isn't easy. While polls have shown both the wage and drug measures to be popular among New Mexicans, legislators have been unable, or unwilling, to get either into law.

And while that may show a disconnect between the legislators and the people who put them in office, it's not an excuse to tinker with the state Constitution.

Besides, this session, with both the Senate and House back under Democratic Party control, more bills of this type have a better chance of making it to the governor's desk.

But fear that a bill, even a bipartisan one that has deep public support, will fall victim to a governor's veto pen is no reason to stop seeking compromise legislation.

There have been 171 amendments to the state Constitution since it was adopted in 1911, but the bulk of them deal with fixes in taxation and revenue, education, government operations and the expansion of civil rights. The U.S. Constitution has been amended only 27 times since its inception in 1789.

The clear message here is that amending the Constitution should not be considered a go-to option to bypass the administrative branch of government, which has veto power over the legislative branch, on routine issues. And that especially would apply to those issues that can be categorized as the populist flavors of the day.

Passing bills is a difficult process, but it has been designed that way to help maintain consistency in law and encourage best practices. The Constitution was never intended to be a document subject to whims and it should not be made into one by impatient legislators.

Officials full of excuses for failings

For the second consecutive year, Wall Street 24/7, a respected online business news publication, has ranked New Mexico as the worst-run state in the union.

WS24/7 faults the state's high rate of poverty, its low rate of high school graduates and its declining labor force, combined with a high rate of unemployment.

Further, WS24/7 notes, the state's debt and outlook have been downgraded. Our tax shortages were large and unexpected, the publication says.

Comparing New Mexico both to the best-performing states and its neighbors raises a lot of questions.

The best-performing state is North Dakota and the fourth-best performer is Wyoming. Like New Mexico, both of these states rely heavily on oil and gas revenues and are sparsely populated.

North Dakota, WS24/7

says, has the nation's lowest unemployment rate and home prices have increased more than 40 percent in five years.

As in New Mexico, North Dakota state government is facing a large budget gap and North Dakota's economy actually shrank by 2.1 percent this year, but home prices are rising and people are working.

In Wyoming, WS24/7 notes that despite declining oil and gas tax revenue, the state's state budget reserves amount to 50 percent of total annual expenditures, which is apparently far more than enough to cover shortfalls, WS24/7 says.

Wyoming also spends 43 percent more than the national average per student on education, and about 92 percent of Wyoming adults have at least a high school diploma, compared to 87 percent nationwide.

Two of our neighbors, Texas and Colorado, ranked seventh and eighth, respectively.

Texas' population has increased by 1.2 million in five years. WS24/7 calls such growth a "bellwether of a well-managed state."

And, WS24/7 reports, they're working. Texas' unemployment rate is only 4.5 percent.

Meanwhile, Texas state government has managed to save a fifth of its funds as reserves.

Like Texas, Colorado has enjoyed high net population growth, and only 3.1 percent of the Colorado labor force was out of work in October.

Colorado's economy

increased by 3.6 percent in 2015, ranking it fourth in growth. That growth has been lit up by Colorado's legal marijuana business, WS24/7 reports.

The top two states have seen the same impact of falling oil prices as New Mexico, and our neighbors are scooping up people and keeping them employed.

New Mexico needs to start asking hard questions about its tax, regulatory, workforce development and education systems.

Other states seem to be getting beyond the obstacles New Mexico's officialdom cites as excuses.





Ways to warm pets limitless

Usually it isn't until you need something that you realize you don't have it, and, in keeping with the laws of the universe, cold weather is no exception.

When issues arise, one is often faced with making a trip to the store in uncomfortable or impossible conditions, or ordering online, knowing the weather will probably change before the item arrives.

Whether it's a drastic temperature plunge, power outage or just uneven heating in the house, one such moment may come when the humans dig out their long johns, only to look over and see the pets curled in tight little shivering balls or fighting for room under the blankets.

Such instances provide perfect opportunities for the person who likes to save a little money, work through a problem, and, who finds satisfaction in making things.

Here are some ideas using quick, easy tricks, materials that are already around the house, and a little creativity that will warm up the pets, help pass time on those stuck-indoors-days and give new purpose to old clothes you've been meaning to get rid of:

■ Small dog or cat sweaters: Use anything with long sleeves — sweater, sweatshirt, jersey or T-shirt material — lay it flat with arms stretched out and start at the cuff of one arm.

Along the top line of the sleeve, measure a length of what will cover your pet's back from neck to the base of the tail, and on the underside, measure the length from your pet's neck to mid-abdomen, then cut a straight line from one point to the other at a 45 degree angle (this leaves the business parts exposed).

The cuff is now a turtle-neck and the longest side will be the top. Calculate where your pet's legs are in relation to the neck, smooth out flat,

pinch where the legs would be, cut through both sides at one time to create leg holes and your sweater is done.

■ Sweaters for medium-large dogs: Re-purpose children's old shirts, dresses and sweaters for bigger pooches. To make them fit, cut shirts or dresses at a length to keep the hind legs free and trim and roll arms, or cut them off.

Another option is to cut either the front or the back of the shirt in a straight line from neck to waist and quickly stitch in a couple of small pieces of Velcro on each side for an adjustable fit.

■ Legwarmers from old or odd socks — Cut a hole in the toes of old socks just big enough for your bigger pet's paw to fit through and slide on the legs for extra warmth.

For smaller pets, do the same with old cotton glove fingers or infant socks.

■ Itty-bitty sock-sweaters — For small dogs, puppies and kittens, cut the toe completely off an old or odd sock that can stretch to the diameter of your pet's widest point.

Smooth the sock flat, pinch where the legs would be, cut through both sides at one time to create leg holes and enjoy your new argyle critter.

■ Ski masks — Cut a sock at the heel. The closed toe is now the top of the head. Cut a face-sized, round hole in one side of the sock just below the curve of the toe, cut two small slits for ears above the hole and use the bottom of the sock for a neck warmer.

Note: Be sure items fit comfortably.



Greyhounds fall to Tigers in Heart of Texas Bowl

COPPERAS COVE, Texas — Every time the Greyhounds landed a blow in the Heart of Texas Bowl on Dec. 3, Fort Hays State seemed to have a counter punch ready.

But even before then, the Tigers had landed more than enough haymakers and grabbed their first Division II bowl win in school history with a 45-12 rout of Eastern New Mexico.

Jacob Mezera threw for 203 yards and two touchdowns, and Shaquille Cooper amassed 212 yards of offense and two scores in a game the Tigers (8-4) never trailed and led 35-9 at the half.

None of the three scores for the Greyhounds (7-5) went unanswered very long. Down 14-0 early in the second quarter, Eastern finally got on the board when junior Kamal Cass punched it in from a yard out. But DeAndre James took the ensuing kickoff 88 yards the other way at the 13:01 mark. The Greyhounds got some

of that back in the final minute of the half when Bailey Hale — who had an extra point blocked earlier in the quarter — notched a 32-yard field goal with :41 left. But Mezera found Cooper on a 40-yard pass just 28 seconds later.

Hale connected again after a scoreless fourth quarter, this time from 45 yards out with 12:15 to go on the night. In the final counter-punch, Kenneth Iheme scored just over two minutes later on a 24-yard rush.

The Greyhounds actually outgained the Tigers 408-402 on the night, including 319 yards on 70 carries. But they were haunted by miscues, including six fumbles — five by quarterback Wyatt Strand — and 226 yards in penalties.

Paul Terry led the Hounds with 89 yards on six rushes, while Cass had 66 yards on 19 carries.

Defensive back Todd Countee led the Hounds with 10 tackles, seven solo, and Eastern got sacks from KeAndre Hall and Neami Tuifua.
