City celebrates Rawhide Days

The gathering drew over 2,500, according to event coordinator.

Reconnecting with locals, meeting new people and being part of the Old West makes Tucumcari feel like home, according to Shirley Brinegar.

Brinegar, the widow of Paul Brinegar, was one of the returning family members of characters from the TV series 'Rawhide,' that was cel-

ebrated last weekend in Tucumcari. The second annual Rawhide Days festival was held Thursday-Saturday, drawing in more than 2,500 people throughout the weekend, said Karen Alarcon, event coordinator.

Alarcon said this year, the bulk of the events took place at the Tucumcari Convention Center and the Quay County Fair Barn. She said stretching out the venues was the only way to make room for all of the events.

"While the event was a success, we learned a lot from the event and have already begun planning to make next year's event even better," Alarcon said.

Brinegar said she enjoyed coming back to Tucumcari where she had the opportunity to reminisce about her late husband and share time with her family and friends in the town she considers a second home.

"Mother has been talking about coming back to Tucumcari for a year," said Mark Brinegar, Shirley's son.

He said that his mother began to show her excitement even more when they began to confirm the flight, car rental and hotel reservations for the trip.

"I have done a lot of things in my life, but I have never felt more alive than I do right now," Mark Brinegar

said during the Rawhide Days parade. "The feeling of being at the event with the people was exactly the same wonderful feeling I had walked away with last year," said Chrystie Wooley, daughter of Sheb Wooley, Rawhide actor.

Wooley said she felt right at home being back in Tucumcari, taking to heart what a local resident told her: "I know Nashville, Tennessee, but you have a second home here and people who love you."

"It is hard to explain; it fills my soul back up, and it is hard to leave

Mesalands Community College graduates 87

Mesalands Community College graduates should not just shoot for the stars but shoot for a better career, a better future and better version of themselves, according to student speaker Sadie McAllister.

McAllister addressed her fellow graduates during the commencement ceremony Friday at the Tucumcari High School auditorium.

Mesalands had 87 graduates that received their high school equivalency diploma, occupational certificates, applied science certificates, liberal arts certificates, associate of arts degrees, associate applied science degree and bachelors of university studies.

McAllister said she was honored to speak on behalf of the graduat-

ing class. She said Mesalands has given the graduates the foundation they need to move on to the next step of their lives.

"I will keep it short and sweet. We made it; now it's time to move on to our brighter future," McAllister said.

The commencement speaker for Friday's ceremony was former Sen. Clinton Harden, R-District 7, who began his speech with words of wisdom from former New Mexico Gov. Gary Johnson.

"Gov. Johnson told me that a good speech always has a good opening and strong finish, but most importantly, they should be very close together," Harden said.

Harden said community colleges are essential to improving lives through education. He said at least half of American undergraduates are enrolled in community colleges.

"I am convinced that one of the

best investments legislators can make is in the funding and support of community colleges," Harden said, adding that community colleges help to prepare students to enter numerous and growing fields of employment. nomie growth. Harden said Tucumcari is a perfect example of featuring the nation's highest classroom at the North American Wind Research and Training Center. He said Mesalands is always looking for new ways to help their students

Coordinator: Music Showcase a success

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A strong reception by local residents and attendance by visitors from across the nation has prompted the Tucumcari Columbus Club to plan a second New Mexico Music Showcase.

"This is an event that can draw the following of the bands to Tucumcari," said Jerry Lopez, event coordinator, adding that despite the inclement weather forcing them to cancel the car show and vendors not attending, the show was a success. He said even with the snow fall, one area resident, Joe Dominguez, brought out his 1955 Impala and was awarded the trophy for best original classic.

"We had to admire his spirit," Lopez said. "Even with such bad weather, Joe Dominguez still took part in the event. That showed us just how much our local residents supported the event."

Lopez said originally, it was not organizers' intent to hold the event on April 29 so early in the year. He said the date was the only one available for the Tucumcari Columbus Club to hold the event.

"After much consideration, organizers decided to schedule the event on the available date," Lopez said. "This was a way for us to get our foot in the door. A way for us to start the event, see how well it would be received and create a following."

Lopez said the support of local business sponsors and the funding from the Tucumcari Lodger's Tax Board was what made the event possible. He said the commissioners and city manager were also very supportive in the creation of this event.

Lopez said the final count of ticket sales was more than 500 with 150 to 175 of those tickets being sold to out-of-town visitors. He said the main concert, which featured performers such as Darren Cordova and Carlos Medina, sold out three weeks before the event.

"I had people calling me, stopping by my house and leaving notes everywhere asking me for tickets," Lopez said. "Many of the people asking me for tickets were people I knew, and I felt bad telling them we had no tickets left."

Lopez said on the night of the concert, the attendance exceeded their initial projections, and more chairs had to be set up to accommodate the capacity crowd. He said this has prompted them to look at the set up for next year's event in order to ensure there is enough seating and still room to dance.

Lopez said the local bands, including the Skyliners, had local follow-

ings at the event. He said the other bands, including two from Pecos, had fans who traveled to the event. Organizers have listened to the people and have already begun choosing next year's entertainment.

"We want to have a new selection of bands for people to enjoy each year," Lopez said. "However, Carlos Media and Darren Cordovas' support in putting on this event were crucial to its success."

Lopez said Medina is also working on a project that will feature episodes taped in Tucumcari.

"We will be asking Carlos and Darren back to the event," Lopez said, adding that next year's event will be held later in the year, offering a lower chance of snow interfering with planned events. He said thanks to the Quay County government, the corn hole tournament was able to be moved into the Quay County Fair Barn.

"This tournament was a huge success with talks of starting a local league," said Chris Ortiz, local corn hole enthusiast.

Ortiz said the tournament had 12 teams participating in the team tournament and more than 20 people participating in the singles tournament, and the overwhelming response to the tournament has local players considering starting a league.

Lopez said next year's event will be a two-day event with live music, vendors and the first round of the corn hole tournament. He said it was surprising to him to see the interest expressed in the corn hole tournament.

"We had interest from people living on the east coast who wanted to enter the tournament but ultimately, didn't come due to the weather," Lopez said.

He added that there are plans to hold another corn hole tournament later this year.



Soda tax won't deter obesity, sugar habits

Santa Fe voters turned out in record numbers last week and soundly defeated a proposed 2-cents-per-ounce tax on sugary soft drinks that Mayor Javier Gonzales hoped would put an extra 1,000 kids in pre-kindergarten classes for free or at cut-rate prices.

While the proposal might have sounded good on its face — fight obesity and get more kids into early education — 58 percent of those who voted didn't drink that Kool-Aid. And an impressive 37.6 percent of registered voters turned out to vote.

Had the soda tax passed, Santa Fe would have matched Boulder, Colorado, as having the highest such tax in the nation. In Santa Fe's case, it was estimated that it would raise about \$10.6 million a year for early childhood education — and added \$1.44 to the cost of a six pack and nearly \$22 to a canister of lemonade mix.

This was a hotly debated contest, pitting lower-income Hispanic residents who rejected the tax against high-end neighborhoods that favored it, though not on Election Day. It was fueled by a jaw-dropping \$3.3 million spent nearly equally by supporters and opponents.

Billionaire Michael Bloomberg, who banned the sale of large sugary drinks when he was mayor of New York City (and was then reversed by that state's highest court), sank more than \$1 million into the pro-tax effort here. He also spent \$1.6 million to help get a similar tax passed in Philadelphia and \$18 million to get them passed in San Francisco and Oakland.

And because a successful campaign in Santa Fe was likely to fuel initiatives across New Mexico, we're glad the initiative failed.


As the Albuquerque Journal has noted before, there's ample research showing any educational gains youngsters make in pre-K virtually disappear by third grade, though other research indicates pre-K students are likely to have higher incomes and not turn to crime later in life.

There was little assurance Santa Fe's expanded pre-K program would be well vetted and monitored. Mayor Gonzales promised the program would be staffed by highly trained and licensed people with high-quality credentials and services. But those are the same adjectives used every year to try to justify a raid on the Land Grant Permanent Fund to fund early childhood "education," sans any supporting qualifications or accountability measures.

There's no question New Mexico, like every other state, has a serious problem with obesity and diabetes. But it's debatable whether a soda tax would drastically change people's behavior in the long run.

And there's little doubt many soda/juice/energy-drinking Santa Feans would simply drive outside the city limits to other municipalities to load up on their favorite sugary drinks — which would have cut into that \$10 million anticipated for pre-K.

Nation built on individual rights

President Donald Trump signed an order Thursday that effectively overturns a law prohibiting tax-exempt organizations from political activities for or against individual political candidates.

The chief beneficiaries of this order are conservative Christian churches whose leaders have been clamoring to repeal the tax-code measure for decades.

They say this measure violates their First Amendment religious rights.

I beg to differ. It is Trump's ruling that effectively restricts religious freedom to all but those religious conservatives who apparently think their religious freedom includes imposing their beliefs on others.

Trump has asked federal agencies to find ways around the Johnson amendment, a 1954 tax-code law passed by Congress, not a Constitutional amendment, that prohibits tax-exempt

organizations, especially including churches, from working for or against the election of candidates for office.

The Johnson amendment was designed to shield non-profit organizations from political influence. Most non-profits, including many churches, support the amendment for that reason.

The amendment has been mostly ineffective. It never stopped Pat Robertson, Jerry Falwell and other conservative Christian leaders from making their pro-Republican candidate feelings obvious.

It never stopped the Berrigan brothers, radical

left-wing Roman Catholic priests, from making obvious their opposition to Republican President Richard Nixon, either.

Repealing the amendment, however, could create a potentially dangerous mingling of politics and religion that would not be healthy for either.

Elected officials openly beholden to churches could easily be pressured into denying rights to many religious minorities, be they Christian, Muslim, Jewish, Buddhist or adherents to any other belief system, not to mention the LGBT community.

Examples: Muslim women could be barred from wearing hijabs. Essential services could be denied to homosexuals for no other reason than their sexuality.

Politicians could easily turn churches into thinly disguised political action committees mainly bent on raising campaign funds.

The First Amendment to the Constitution begins, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof."

The first clause clearly implies that your right to exercise your religion cannot legally impede my right to exercise another religion or to adhere to none at all.

Even if the majority of Americans call themselves Christian, we are not by definition a Christian nation.

We are a nation built on individual rights guaranteed by a living, breathing, amendable Constitution.

Thank God.

Local invents BugZing repellent

Because mosquitoes have built-in chemical analysis labs and a local scientist has been working in fuel cell technology, Quay County can now play a role in helping South Pacific islanders combat the Zika virus and other mosquito-borne infections.


Bob Hockaday, a local independent Tucumcari scientist, has invented a device called a BugZing that can be worn like a wristwatch and puts out a scent that mosquitoes find repulsive, but the wearer cannot detect.

While Hockaday's device is not yet licensed for sale in the U.S., a special permit from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is likely to allow the BugZing to be used to deal with a mosquito-borne health emergency in American Samoa, a seven-island U.S. territory in the South Pacific.

That permit is still pending, Hockaday said, but in the meantime, he is producing devices to ready them for shipment with the help of his son, Bobby Hockaday, and nephew, Ryan Pottenger, and some Tucumcari residents.

American Samoa is in a quandary, according to Rep. Vesi Fautanu, Jr., a member of American Samoa's legislature. Fautanu contacted Hockaday about BugZing after hearing about it through a cousin of Hockaday's.

Fautanu said American Samoa's ability to use chemical sprays to

eradicate mosquitoes is limited by a lack of resources and by regulations that prohibit the sprays in the territory's many environmentally sensitive areas.

Residents observe "cleanup Fridays" to empty sources of standing water and clean out other places where mosquitoes might breed, he said, but American Samoa continues to have a high number of incidents of dangerous mosquito-borne diseases like Zika virus and dengue fever.

The BugZing promises to help

ward off these health hazards, he said.

The BugZing works, Hockaday said, despite mosquitoes' ability to detect carbon-dioxide as humans breathe it out, which is what signals them to hum in for a nourishing poke through the skin.

With Hockaday's invention, however, the mosquitoes get a whiff of the citronella and Deet or eucalyptus scent on the human's skin and turn away, Hockaday said.

The mosquitoes' built-in chemical labs, he said, can detect more

than 50 chemicals, and a combination of citronella and Deet or lemon-eucalyptus scent sends them literally looking for new blood.

Hockaday said the devices have been tested on volunteer subjects, some of them family members and many volunteers at New Mexico State University's Hansen Laboratory, which specializes in studying diseases carried by mosquitoes and their biological relatives.

Dr. Immo Hansen, who heads the laboratory, declares in a video on

the BugZing website that BugZing has been found "very effective."

Hockaday said that combining mosquito-repelling citronella with another repellent chemical has a far greater effect on repelling mosquitoes than either chemical alone.

The device requires energy to distribute the stuff mosquitoes hate. The energy comes from a narrow tube made of a flexible plastic that acts as a fuel cell. Hockaday has a patent on the material. Fuel cells use hydrogen and a chemical catalyst to produce electricity that is transferred to electrodes in the tube and then used to power the chemical-spreading mechanism in the BugZing device.

Fuel cells can put out up to 80 times more energy over time than many batteries, Hockaday said, but their use in the U.S. is nearly prohibited on small devices due to the perceived dangers of their hydrogen fuel, which have triggered security concerns in the U.S.

The BugZing is also rechargeable, Hockaday said, unlike other mosquito-repellent products. In the U.S., he said, recharging is accomplished by replacing a cartridge. In developing countries, he said, shopkeepers can inject chemical recharges.

Before the devices can be marketed in the U.S., Hockaday said, they must undergo a rigorous series of tests on humans to satisfy requirements of EPA licensing.

Hockaday is currently working with the Hansen Laboratory to design and conduct those tests, he said.

Residents discuss opposition plan

Commission votes to hire firm against borehole project.

While anti-borehole activists and the Quay County Commission agreed Monday they all want to stop the proposed drilling of a three-mile-deep borehole near Nara Visa, they could not agree on how to do it.

The commission voted to proceed with the plan that Warren Frost, the county attorney, proposed in which the county would hire a consulting firm to help oppose the project, which could cost up to \$40,000, in National Environmental Protection Act (NEPA) proceedings, which may begin within the next several months.

Anti-borehole protesters filled the seats in the Quay County Commission chamber Monday and spilled out into the hallway as spokespersons made a case for the commission to issue a temporary moratorium on any drilling in Quay County.

Borehole protesters say the test borehole — which bidding contractors say will only test a possible method for disposing of nuclear wastes — could result in nuclear waste being buried in similar boreholes nearby.

The protesters even brought children to ask the commission not to jeopardize their future by allowing the test borehole and the possibility of nuclear waste repositories to Nara Visa.

David Clements, a Ruidoso attorney whose wife, Erin, has relatives who own the Hat T Ranch near Nara Visa, said the moratorium was the strongest option to pursue.

It was the last chance to avoid federal involvement in the project's progress. Once that happens, he said, there is nothing local opponents can do to stop the project from proceeding.

The protesters expressed

disappointment when the commission voted against giving a first reading to an ordinance that would order the moratorium. Final passage would involve a public hearing and second hearing at a later meeting, County Clerk Ellen White said.

"You're selling us down the river," said Bart Wyatt, a Nara Visa rancher and prominent spokesperson for the opposition.

Most of the borehole opponents then left the room, but some stayed to hear Frost propose his plan.

Frost said the moratorium would have no effect at all on impeding the progress of federal involvement.

Instead, he asked the commission to authorize the hiring of AECOM, a Los Angeles-based consulting firm that specializes in the Environmental Protection Act. AECOM has an office in Denver.

"When the Department of Energy sees that we're putting up that kind of opposition, they are probably going to say, 'we don't want to mess with this site anymore,'" Frost said.

He said getting into the environmental process early is the best way to combat the borehole project now.

Frost said he learned that lesson when the village of Logan sued unsuccessfully to stop the construction of the intake structure on the south side of Ute Lake for the Eastern New Mexico Water Utility Authority's \$550 million project to pipe Ute Lake water to Curry County.

"The court told us the

arguments were all there, but we had gotten involved a little too late," he said, and that was the mistake he wants to avoid with the borehole project.

Despite opposition from the county commission, the Tucumcari City Commission, and county commissions in Union and Harding counties in New Mexico, the contractors bidding for the Nara Visa borehole for the Department of

Energy are pushing ahead with the project's next phase, borehole opponents said Monday.

Chip Cameron, a spokesperson for Enercon, which is bidding to be the project manager for the borehole project, said

the next phase, Phase 2, will only involve more public outreach and education.

In this phase, he said, the contractors will continue to hold public information meetings and work with public schools and Mesalands Community College on Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) education programs that the borehole would bring to the county.

The contractors, Enercon and DOSECC Core Drilling Services, are already sending information to the DOE to prepare for an environmental assessment study, Cameron said. The DOE would present a proposal to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, which would make the decision whether to approve the project or order a full environmental impact study.


