## Borehole meeting draws 150

While more than 150 people attended a meeting to oppose a proposed borehole test in Quay County, one Tucumcari resident said the opposition "simply is not enough."

"It is going to take all of us, the whole community, to make a difference," said Mike Trujillo, Tucumcari resident.

Trujillo spoke out at the end of the March 27 meeting

at the Tucumcari Convention Center. He said the word needs to spread to all of the community that it's up to everyone to tell their friends, family and neighbors.

"There should have been more people at this meeting to find out about what's being proposed," Trujillo said.

The organizers of the meeting — residents of Nara Visa, Logan and Quay County who oppose the project — have centered around the importance of voicing local communities' united opposition of the borehole project.

The banquet featured several raffles for firearms, knives and accessories that attendees could participate in through the purchase of tickets.

All of the money raised during the banquet is used to fund Quay County youth shooting sports, hunter safety programs, women's introduction to firearms classes and improvements at area gun clubs/shooting ranges,

courses planned for this summer and improvements at the gun range at the Logan Gun Club, Clark added.

## Homes hit by vandals

Doors are kicked in, but no home entry, theft reported.

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Although there is no physical evidence linking a series of vandalism to local homes, the Tucumcari Police Department is advising residents to be vigilant.

At 2:28 a.m. on March 5, an unknown number of subjects cut the power to a residence on the 2000 block of South 11th Street then kicked in the rear door, said Sgt. Patricia Lopez.

Lopez said the residents were home when this incident occurred and called 911. She said the residents reported that no one entered the home, and it was determined nothing was missing.

"The main concern is the fact that the residents were home when the incident occurred," Lopez said.

She said there have been other incidents reported, one prior to and two after the March 5 incident involving the door of residences being kicked in. She said access was not gained to any of the homes in any of these incidents.

"While there is no physical evidence connecting these incidents, our main concern is keeping the public informed and safe," said Pete Rivera, deputy chief.

Rivera said preliminary investigations have not revealed a pattern to the crimes, but there similarity has the department looking into the matter deeper.

Lopez said currently the TPD is coordinating with Crimestoppers in seeking information from the public on the March 5 incident. She said a reward of up to \$1,000 is being offered for information that leads to the arrest of the individuals involved.

Anyone with information is asked to call Crimestoppers at 575-461-3507. All callers can remain anonymous.

# Water authority files suit for land

CLOVIS — Following the failure of previous negotiations, the Eastern New Mexico Water Utility Authority is asserting eminent domain rights to secure passage through the land of a local property owner.

The ENMWUA filed a lawsuit last week after its efforts to purchase a temporary construction easement from landowner Phillip Chavez and his co-owner father were unsuccessful.

Attorney David Richards, representing the board, said Chavez and father would have 30 days to reply, but the parties can "resolve it at any time if there's an agreement."

Chavez said he will let the legal process continue on schedule and doesn't expect to say much on the matter for another two months.

"At this time, it's still ongoing, and I can't forecast too much of what's going to happen," he said. "One side is looking one way and the other side is looking the other way. It's basically a kind of tug-of-war."

The property in question is on the west side of Clovis, south of Mendenhall Avenue, along Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. The board seeks an easement there approximately 883 feet long and 85 feet deep, according to ENMWUA Executive Director Justin Howalt.

As of March 23, the board has secured almost 24 of roughly five dozen easements needed for construction of the pipeline that would connect Clovis, Portales, Cannon Air Force Base and surrounding areas with the Ute Reservoir in Quay County.

The project is large and storied, said Howalt, with the ultimate goal of establishing Ute Reservoir as the primary water source to the community. Construction on the Ute Dam finished in 1963 when officials took pre-emptive action to create a sustainable alternative to the Ogallala (or High Plains) Aquifer, according to the ENMWUA website.

The Eastern New Mexico Rural Water System, locally known as the Ute Water Project, was federally authorized in 2009. The water utility authority was established the following year, replacing the former Eastern New Mexico Rural Water Authority, which operated under a joint powers agreement. The change gave the authority powers of eminent domain.

Richards explained that properties needed for the water project are appraised twice, and the full amounts of those appraisals are offered to property owners, as well as information on the project and opportunities for discussion.

"In those instances when the property owner was not satisfied and would not grant the easement for the amount of money that was offered,

ultimately the board authorized filing suit to condemn the land," said Richards.

Condemnation of the land is a legal term for asserting eminent domain rights and does not reflect on the quality of the land.

"In any eminent domain action, there has to be a public purpose, and the public purpose is the construction of a water pipeline for ultimate distribution of water from the Ute Reservoir," said Richards.

Howalt has said at various public meetings the preferred option is to negotiate with private landowners versus piggybacking off the right-of-ways owned by municipalities, because the project requires a 33-inch steel pipeline that can't be easily moved once installed.

The lawsuit against Chavez is the only such case authorized by the board, he added. The vast majority of other negotiations were accepted outright or are still in progress.

Howalt said Chavez declined an offer of more than \$8,000 for the easement on his land.

Chavez said he considered the initial contact from the board to be "informal" and somewhat "presumptuous."

"I felt that the figure (offered by the board) would naturally be a low-ball figure to begin with," he said. "We're still entertaining the idea of what to do. I don't want to say too much until the very end."

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# 'Missing' firearms found

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All but one of 17 missing firearms have been located or cleared from the evidence and property logs of the Tucumcari Police Department, according to City Manager Jared Langenegger.

In February, Langenegger issued a report from an inventory conducted by an outside consultant that revealed there were 17 firearms from nine criminal cases that were unaccounted for on TPD's evidence and property log.

Langenegger said after an internal review, it was determined that many of the weapons were never missing at all; there were several errors in the paperwork, such as misfiling, concerning the firearms.

The cases with the unaccounted firearms were between 2007 and 2014, with the firearms ranging from BB guns to handguns and rifles.

Langenegger said the one remaining firearm could have been released to the owner or destroyed. He said the weapon has been entered into the National Crime Information Center (NCIC) database, and should the weapon's serial number be run through the federal database, TPD will be notified.

"This issue has prompted me to look into a new evidence logging system for the department," said David Lathrom, police chief.

Lathrom said the new system would use individual bar codes that would be attached to any evidence or

property taken into custody by officers. He said the system will allow for a digital database that will show the entry, status and release of any and all evidence or property.

Langenegger said Lathrom has been putting together bids for the new system that would cost \$6,000 to purchase. He said the missing firearms were the most noted concern raised by the review. That issue has been addressed with the accounting of the weapons and the new system will help to prevent future incidents, Langenegger added.

Most of the issue was caused by paperwork that would show what had been done with the firearm in relation to the cases, said Deputy Chief Pete Rivera.

"The weapons were never stolen," Rivera said. "The weapons were either released to the rightful owner, stored or have been destroyed."

Rivera said the inventory was conducted by Moriarty Police Chief Bobby Garcia in October 2016 before the retirement of former TPD chief Jason Braziel. Rivera and Braziel asked Garcia to conduct the inventory review to prepare for the departure of former custodian officer Kenny Fernandez and the retirement of Braziel.

Garcia said Braziel presented him with a formal letter in September asking him to conduct the review of the

TPD evidence and property. He was not paid for the review.

"The overall assessment of TPD's evidence and property logs was not unique; this happens to evidence rooms of smaller departments frequently," Garcia said.

Garcia said Tucumcari did not have a good records management system at the time he conducted the review.

He said many times the problem with the documents or logs of evidence and property at smaller departments are due to the duties being assigned as a side duty to an officer — the evidence custodian placed in charge is also a patrol officer or detective; they have other duties on top of evidence and property logs.

Another issue is officer turnover — if a new evidence custodian is assigned, they are either trained or start a different system of logging and accounting, he said.

In addition, former State Police Lt. Nathan Wallace conducted an operational review of the department, which identified deficiencies in field training, reporting of incidents, investigations and personnel administration.

Langenegger said the issues are going to take some time to fix, but the city and Lathrom are working towards the improvement of the department.

and DOSECC Exploration Services of Salt Lake City, Utah were hired in December by the Department of Energy to explore the possibility of conducting a deep borehole test in Quay County to determine if deep boreholes might offer a safe and practical alternative to mined geologic repositories for nuclear waste storage.

"I was told if I am not part of the solution, I am part of the problem," said Betty Coslett, Tucumcari resident.

Coslett said she was given this message by the family member of a politician who she would not name but stated they would soon be seeking re-election. She said her response to such a claim was simple.

"If it is a solution you need, then why don't you go and drill these holes under Washington D.C. and bury the nuclear waste there," Coslett said.

The DOE seems intent on pursuing the project in Quay County, despite the public objections, said Nara Visa resident and rancher Jay Cammack.

Cammack said he has written the DOE and asked why the organization is pursuing the borehole project and not another project that would better benefit the residents of the county, such as transmission lines for solar and wind energy technology.

Several residents asked what could be done to prevent this project from coming to the county.

Showing and voicing our

united opposition to the companies and the DOE about this project is the first step, said Bart Wyatt, meeting moderator, adding that residents need to take an active role in battling the project by signing petitions and sending letters to the DOE.

"The DOE and Enercon will go away if you, as a community, continue to do what you are doing, in saying no," said Don Hancock with the Southwest Research and Information Center, an organization that provides information to the public on the effects of energy development and resource exploitation, according to its website.

"Your being here tonight, signing the petitions and sending the letters will make a difference," he said.

Hancock said the science behind the borehole test is flawed; there are too many unknown factors to make it a viable option for nuclear waste disposal.

"The one thing the DOE is good at is spending tax payers dollars on research that is not sound," Hancock said.

With the numbers that have been showing up and opposing the project, the DOE may be prompted to abandon the project in Quay County, he added.

Hancock said currently the law prevents the DOE from using eminent domain to seize the land for nuclear waste disposal.

Officials from Enercon and DOSECC did not attend the meeting. The James family, who are open to the project idea and have agreed to let their land be a potential site for the project, also did not attend.

### Federal budget puts state water systems at risk

President Donald Trump's proposed 2018 federal budget eliminates a U.S. Department of Agriculture program that provides millions of dollars in grants and loans to small water and wastewater systems.

It would have a devastating effect on parts of rural New Mexico.

The USDA's Water and Environmental Program last year alone provided \$6.6 million in grants and loans for New Mexico water projects. The program, tailored to serve rural community and water systems serving 10,000 people or fewer, provides grants and low-interest loans to qualifying projects.

Since 2012 the program has provided \$81.6 million in grants and loans for dozens of projects at small water and wastewater systems in 17 New Mexico counties. Without those funds, and USDA oversight, many small water systems would be unable to provide clean drinking water to thousands of rural New Mexicans, some of whom would never have had running water in their homes without the program.

"In New Mexico, something like 85 percent of our water systems serve a population of 500 or less," says Bill Conner, executive director of the New Mexico Rural Water Association, which represents about 480 water systems.

In his 2018 federal budget plan, Trump says that, instead of continuing the Water and Environmental Program, "rural communities can be served by private-sector financing or other federal investments in rural water infrastructure, like the Environmental Protection Agency's State Revolving Funds."

But water systems seeking grants or loans through the program must show that credit was unavailable through conventional lenders at reasonable rates. If they couldn't get financing then, what are the chances they could get it now?

And, though Trump's budget calls for boosting the State Revolving Funds by \$4 million next year, to \$2.3 billion, it would force small water systems to compete with larger and privately owned utilities.

A reasonable argument can be made that the federal government has no business financing local water projects — but unfortunately that's been the system for years.

This should be a serious wake-up call to the New Mexico Legislature to finally get its capital outlay house in order so it can invest in meaningful infrastructure projects.



## Events offer fun, health benefits

Look for the Step into Spring challenge and follow some simple directions.

The walking trail locations are in downtown Tucumcari starting at the Rail Depot, and at Northside Park, Dunn Park, the fitness park across Gamble Avenue from the Tucumcari High School Auditorium, and the gym inside the Tucumcari Recreation Center.

OK, you don't have to use the trails, but you should check them out anyway.

The competition is based on steps, counted by fitness devices, cell phone apps or

pedometers, or computed based on miles multiplied by 2,250, the average number of steps in a mile.

While they compete, participants will lower their risks for heart disease, diabetes and obesity, or reduce the effects of these conditions.

The other event is the second annual Wheels on Fire 100 on Sept. 30.

There is still time to derive the fun and fitness benefits of training for the main challenge, pedaling through the 100-mile loop from Tucumcari to San Jon, Grady and Ragland, then back to Tucumcari.

There are shorter distances as well.

Last year, the event drew 45 cyclists from Amarillo, Albuquerque and other New Mexico and Texas locales, plus a few from further away who happened to be in town.

A few of us locals also par-

ticipated and more have told me they're training for this year's ride.

Last year's participants praised the hospitality at San Jon and Grady, the light traffic and police patrols on the route.

A few stayed on for Fired Up!, the downtown community event that evening. They'll have the same opportunity this year.

"(M)ake it your ambition to lead a quiet life: You should mind your own business and work with your hands ..."

What if you were minding your own business ... and then your neighbor did something that poisoned the water hole, caused cancer in those driving down Interstate 40, or was responsible for babies being born with three heads?

That would be your fault, right?

Because you can't just mind your own business when those around you might be doing dangerous stuff, or planning to do stuff that might be dangerous some day if other stuff happens they can't control.

You know? This is what's happening in Quay County today — a few dozen residents are overreacting to a what-if question that's a long way from becoming any of their business.

A ranching family named James is entertaining thoughts of allowing the Department of Energy to drill two holes on the James' property near Nara Visa.

The holes would be 3 miles deep; one would be 8 1/2

inches wide, the other 17 inches wide. The purpose is to see if it's even possible to drill holes like that, then to evaluate whether deep boreholes might offer a safe and practical option for storing nuclear waste.

Yes, the nuclear waste is what perked up those area residents' ears and turned them into busybodies.

They skipped right over the part about scientific research that could make the world a safer place — not to mention pump millions of dollars into a depressed economy — and jumped straight to the part about the potential for three-headed babies.

Listen up, James neighbors: ■ The family has not yet agreed to participate in the project.

■ The issue is holes in the ground, not storing nuclear waste.

■ The 1-in-a-million

"what-if" scenario could not even begin until after there's an actual plan to store nuclear waste in Quay County, which the government says won't happen and which couldn't happen until after the borehole tests, which haven't started, are completed.

Got it?

It's not time to attack a neighbor; the James' say they feel like they've become lepers in a community where they've lived for 40 years.

They've been shouted down at town hall meetings and even asked how much money it will take to buy them off.

Neighbors who offer their property in the name of scientific research sound like responsible neighbors, not like lepers.

It's important to remember those screaming the loudest, as is usually the case, do not necessarily represent a majority.

Most of the good people of Quay County are independent, hard working, common-sense people with a healthy respect for private property rights and individual liberty.

When government officials tried to tell them how many garage sales they could have

in a year, they initiated an election to recall those government officials. They don't like to be told what to do, and most of them don't usually try to tell each other what to do.

The concept of mind your own business around here is as old and respected as Tucumcari Mountain.

OK, Quay County residents have a reason to be concerned. That's because this project involves the U.S. government.

Raise the red flags right there.

But the actual burying of nuclear waste in Quay County is not even in the talk-about-it stage. If we ever get to that point — remember, DOD says it won't — that would require years of research, debate and then court proceedings.

So relax, Quay County.

Don't treat your neighbors like lepers.

If they decide to loan their property to those working toward a safer way to store nuclear waste, just say thanks.



## Masters not the same without Arnold Palmer

There is no tournament like the Masters, no place like the Augusta National Golf Club. History lurks through every valley, nostalgia oozes from each blade of finely manicured grass. Champions have come and gone, moments of glory and shots of ignominy have been discussed and remembered for decades.

But, through the 81-year history of what is arguably the most famous tournament in the world, the Masters has never seen anyone like Arnold Palmer. It wasn't just the four green jackets he won in a seven-year span that began in the late 1950s. Or the painful near-misses he endured on two other occasions.

It was his magnetism, his James Dean appearance, his matador style. It was his charm in victory and his grace in defeat. Most of all, it was the way he seemed to embrace the patrons — that's what they call them at the Masters — and the way they loved him in return. They stalked the fairways to get a glimpse of him, and the television cameras couldn't take their lens off him.

Arnold Palmer was a presence at the Masters for 62 years — 50 as a player, 10 as an honorary starter, two for the time in between when he wasn't sure he wanted to hit the ceremonial first tee shot. Now, for the first time since 1954, he won't be at the Masters. And his absence will create a massive ache in the collective heart of all who will be in attendance this week at Augusta National.

Palmer died in September at the age of 87, and, seven months after the golf world grappled with his passing, they will do so again at the tournament he helped transform into a global treasure.

"I will be thinking of Arnie all week," said CBS sportscaster Jim Nantz, who has been broadcasting at the Masters for 32 years and developed a special friendship with Palmer.

So much about Palmer and his popularity, his impact on the game, was forged at the Masters.

It was his play in the valleys of Augusta National in 1958, when he won his first Masters, that inspired Sports Illustrated writer Herbert Warren Wind to use the expression "Amen Corner" to describe the action on holes 11, 12 and 13. "Arnie's Army," the nickname used to describe the gallery throngs that trampled fairways to watch their hero, was born in Augusta because of the soldiers at nearby Fort Gordon who manned the leaderboards at the Masters and openly rooted for their new-found hero.

The late Frank Chirkinian, who worked on

and produced Masters telecasts on CBS for 40 years, famously spoke of how the camera fell in love with Palmer during his back-nine charge in 1960. "I thought, 'Holy mackerel, who is this guy?' He absolutely fired up the screen," Chirkinian once said. "It was quite obvious this was the star. It was electrifying."

It all happened at Augusta National. Palmer's legacy budded and flowered amid the pines and valleys like the azaleas in Amen Corner. It is true the great Bobby Jones founded the Masters. But it was Palmer, the son of a groundskeeper, who made it.

"It will never be the same," former two-time U.S. Open champion Curtis Strange said. "The tournament will go on and players will come and go, but there will be a void there, especially this year."

Every year he has attended the Masters since he stopped playing, Strange would go to the Firestone Cabin and have a drink with Palmer and a couple Augusta members, John Harris and Bev Dolan. Strange said he would go three nights in a row and sit in the corner and listen to them tell stories and "solve the world's problems." He called it the highlight of his week.

Strange has always shared a special bond with Palmer. He went to Wake Forest on an Arnold Palmer Scholarship established by the King at his alma mater.

"I grew up with Arnold Palmer in my household and as everybody did," Strange said on a conference call last week. "And then the first time I played the Masters was in '75. I went down there and saw really what Arnie's Army and Arnold Palmer and the people were all about. It was the first time I had ever seen him in his world. And it was spectacular. There was a connection there between Arnold and the people and the people and Arnold that was unlike anything I had ever seen in my life before and since. The way he reacted to them ... and them to him was something special."

"And even last year, when he wasn't doing well, and just for him to make the effort to go and be a part of it, something he loved so dearly, it showed me that it really was a connection there over the years and that they truly loved each other."

Palmer was the Masters. He was the first player to win the green jacket four times, and he did it every other year, beginning in 1958. Jack Nicklaus would eventually break his record with six Masters victories and Tiger Woods would eventually tie him with four. But, for those seven years, Palmer made the Masters what it is today.



### Gryschka solid at Texas Relays

AUSTIN, Texas — Eastern New Mexico University's Melina Gryschka capped a strong performance in the Texas Relays on Saturday, finishing sixth in the women's 1,500 with a time of 4 minutes, 28.45 seconds.

Gryschka was the only ENMU athlete competing in Austin on Saturday while the rest of the team was in Albuquerque for the University of New Mexico's Don Kirby Tailwind Invitational. Earlier in the Texas Relays, Gryschka won Thursday's 3,000 steeplechase in 10:28.99 as the junior from Garbsen, Germany, beating out a number of Division I competitors.

"It was my first steeple of the year," Gryschka said on the ENMU website. "I didn't practice the water

jump at all, so I was a little bit afraid. But everything went well and it felt easy."

On Saturday at Albuquerque, Kandace Miles won the women's 400 in 1:02.48 and Dominique Zamora won the women's 200 in 25.63, while Sierra Quinones came in second in the 800 in 2:23.63. Also for the women, Coley Norcross was fifth in 11:06.92 and Abby Kepfer seventh in the 3,000, while Kepfer ran fifth (5:11.08) and Norcross was seventh in the 1,600.

For the men, Ivar Moinat was third in the 800 in 1:55.13, while Marcel Skalecki placed fourth in the men's 1,600 in 4:13.20, leading a 4-6-7-8-9 ENMU showing. John Runberg was second (127-2) and Luis Duarte third in javelin, and Matthew Kind finished third in discus at 127-1.

ENMU squads are back in action

on Friday in the West Texas A&M Open at Canyon.

**Rodeo** — At Snyder, Texas, ENMU's women were second with 215 points while the men were seventh with 190 in competition hosted by Western Texas College.

### NMSU tuition hike postponed

LAS CRUCES — New Mexico State University's governing board on Monday postponed a decision on whether to increase tuition for students next fall.

Regents cited uncertainty about the state's budget, but said the lack of a decision on 2017-18 tuition rates puts the university in a difficult place because enrollment for the fall semester begins in a few days.

"What I'm hoping for is that the leaders of the Legislature and the Fourth Floor (governor's office) can come together to some agreement so we can know what our state appropriation will be for Instruction and General funding," said Board of Regents Chairwoman Debra Hicks, referring to the main pool of funding the university receives from the state.

Regents on Monday were considering up to a 6 percent tuition-and-fee rate hike for the NMSU main campus. They voted 5-0 to postpone the decision.

The Legislature and Gov. Susana Martinez have been in a budget standoff since the close of the 2017 regular leg-

islative session in mid-March. Martinez has criticized a two-bill package sent to her by the Legislature that would have modest impacts on higher education and public education but also would increase some taxes. She has until Friday to sign the package, fully veto or partially veto the bills. Or, no action at all would result in a pocket veto of the legislation.

Several faculty members, some staff and a graduate student addressed NMSU regents in the meeting, saying they supported the increase because the alternative would mean financial cuts to jobs, services and programs.

Jim Peach, a 37-year economics faculty member at NMSU, said he attended to express support for the "modest tuition increase."

"The fat is gone," he said. "Additional cuts really amount to cutting core services and essential functions of the university."

### Man accused of slaying caretaker

CARRIZOZO — Andrew Poteet Magill, 25, of Roswell, was arrested Sunday on an open count of murder in the

death of the caretaker of the historic Coe Ranch in Glencoe in what law enforcement officials described as a bloody scene in which the victim nearly was decapitated.

Magill also is accused of shooting a Lincoln County deputy sheriff while at the Lincoln County Medical Center, but charges are pending in the shooting incident.

The blood-covered body of a 61-year-old woman was found outside a residence at the ranch with an ax nearby that appeared to be the murder weapon. Her head nearly was severed, according to the affidavit for arrest warrant filed by Lincoln County Sheriff's deputies, who arrived on the scene within 10 minutes in response to a welfare check call received at 8:09 p.m. Saturday.

### NMSU rodeo team marks 75 years

LAS CRUCES — When Kentucky native Logan Corbett landed in Las Cruces last year to become the new rodeo coach for New Mexico State University, he inherited a highly accomplished athletics program that turns 75 this year.

But the coaching job, Corbett said, also came with added pressure to build on the team's history of success.

Corbett is the second person to hold the title of rodeo coach, following in the footsteps of his predecessor, Jim Dewey Brown, the team's first official coach who was hired in 2002. Before Brown, the team was managed for several decades by academic advisers from NMSU, Corbett said. It wasn't until 2002 that the university recognized the team needed a full-time coach, he added.

Under Brown's leadership, Corbett said, "The team took a drastic turn for the better," transforming the team from a loosely organized athletics program established in 1942 to a nationally dominating force.

Brown's teams earned seven national championships, nine regional championships in men's events and seven regional championships in women's events, Corbett said. Brown also increased the team's size, reaching an all-time high of 90 members in 2009.

## Governor expected to reject budget, says legislator

Eastern New Mexico legislators said the 2017 legislative session was a fairly productive one, though some noted the state's fiscal year 2018 budget will likely be rejected by Governor Susana Martinez.

Senator Pat Woods, R-Broadview, said difficult decisions are ahead for the state if the Legislature has to meet in special session to pass another budget.

"We put some stuff before the governor we hoped she would go with, and she didn't. We'll just try it again if she wants us to, but she's gonna have to tell us exactly what she'll take," Woods said. "We spent 60 days trying to come up with something, and if that didn't work, everybody's through guessing. Now somebody's got to come to the table and say, 'Well, this is what we'll take and this is what we won't take.'"

Woods said two potential solutions for balancing the budget are raising taxes and cutting education, neither of which he is eager to pursue.

"Every time we raise a tax, somebody at home gets to pay it. Sooner or later it works right down to the guy that's buying something," he said. "Education is probably the most important thing we can do for our kids. We may have to educate them with less money. If we can't raise taxes, that's about all that's left. I don't know how we

can get by with any less roads than what we've got. We need water, we need sewer. I just don't know."

While the original \$6.1 billion balanced budget was not exactly what Senator Stuart Ingle, R-Portales, had hoped for, he believed it was an acceptable solution.

"There wasn't everything in there I liked, but generally speaking it's a decent budget bill," he said, adding he is hopeful it will pass the governor's desk. "It's hard to tell, depending on what the governor signs and vetoes and line-items. There's some things there that were worked on, and hopefully we'll get some things signed where we can finish the budget for the rest of the year."

In addition to the budget, Woods noted the passing of Senate Bill 381, a bill he sponsored which would allow rural school districts to use sport utility vehicles in place of school buses, while Ingle was focused squarely on the budget.

"The budget's always the main thing that we have to accomplish in this state. We have to have a balanced budget and we have to have the things that are part of the budget that pay for our schools and our correction systems, state police, all those things," he said.

**Sumner Lake:** Fishing was fair to good using jigs, minnows, curly tail grubs and bottom bouncer spinner

minnow combinations for walleye. Fishing was fair using crank baits, spinner baits, swim baits, grubs and Senkos for white bass, smallmouth bass and largemouth bass. We had no other reports.

**Ute Lake:** Fishing was good using bottom bouncer spinner minnow combinations, jig and minnow combinations, curly tail grubs and jerk baits for walleye. The fish were found in depths ranging from 10 to 25 feet. Fishing was fair to good

using soft plastics and spinner baits for smallmouth bass and largemouth bass. Fishing for white bass slowed a bit from the previous week but a few were caught by anglers using grubs and crank baits. Fishing was fair to good using stink baits and prepared baits in shallow water for catfish. The surface water temp was in the low 50s.


