## Police get wage increase

□ Chief: The raise will help recruit officers, retain existing staff.

Tucumcari Police Department employees will receive a \$2.50-per-hour raise across the board in a move Police Chief David Lathrom says will save money in reduced overtime and training expenses.

The city commission on Thursday

unanimously approved the raises.

Lathrom said the raises were needed to help retain existing police officers and recruit new ones. The department is down two officers at present and is at nearly double the amount budgeted for police overtime pay, he said.

Police departments in surrounding communities, including Santa Rosa and Clovis, he said, pay officers in the range of \$18 to \$20 per hour, compared with Tucumcari's \$15.26-per-hour pay for certified officers.

The result? "We train officers for other departments," Lathrom said.

That's because Tucumcari pays to

train officers, Lathrom said, and after training, officers too often hire on with other departments.

In all, he said, the \$2.50 pay raise would cost \$89,143.60 per year. That would be more than offset, he said, by savings of \$33,936.95 by avoiding excess overtime, \$51,954.43 in unused pay for sergeants and corporals and the \$35,000 per officer training cost.

In the 2016-2017 fiscal year, Lathrom said, the department hired six new officers. At the end of the year, he said, there were two openings, based on 12 officers allowed in the police

department's budget, he said.

First District Commissioner Ralph Moya said officers would still be spending time in court and working cases after their regular hours, so the savings may not materialize.

Lathrom said that the department had "blown through" its \$39,000 overtime budget and had overspent it by \$33,000, about 86 percent more than budgeted, in the fiscal year that ended June 30.

Moya made the motion to authorize the hourly increase, and the commission voted to enact it.

## Director: Field day successful

□ 120 attended the Ag Science Center's annual event for farmers, ranchers.

Despite a lower attendance than its prior year iteration, the annual field day at the New Mexico State Universities Ag Science Center in Tucumcari was a success, said Leonard Lauriault, center director.

Lauriault said this year 120 people attended the field day, 14 less than last year's event. He said even with the lower numbers, the field day met and surpassed his expectations.

"One of the field day's goals is to give those farm-

ers, ranchers who are involved or interested in our research a chance to meet the experts," Lauriault said. "The other goal is to give those new to our ag center a chance to learn and become interested in our research."

Lauriault said throughout the year he fields more than 100 calls about research — usually either to gather information or suggest a topic for research.

Lauriault recalled a 2008 incident where a farmer had to terminate an alfalfa field that had been planted for three years due to weak, thin

## Mesalands to offer EMT courses

□ The school looks to help alleviate shortage of certified technicians.

The instructor of a new course beginning this fall at Mesalands Community College aims to reduce the shortage of certified Emergency Medical Technicians.

"The shortage of certified EMTs is a problem felt locally, across the state and nation," said Matthew Williams, Mesalands EMS faculty.

Williams will begin teaching three EMT courses at Mesalands starting on Aug. 25, said Kimberly Hanna, public relations director.

Hanna said it is important to understand the courses offered at Mesalands do not award anyone EMT certification. She said at the completion of the three courses, worth 12 credit hours, students will be eligible to test for state and national licensure as an EMT-Basic under the guidance of a medical director.

Williams said the courses — EMT 123 Basic, EMTL Emergency

Medical Technician and EMT 124 Basic Clinical — will provide students with entry to advanced EMT preparation and training.

"Having a EMT course in our area will be a great benefit to Tucumcari and the surrounding communities," said Brenda Rivale, interim director for Tucumcari EMS.

Rivale, who is also the Village of Logan's EMS director, said before Mesalands offered the courses individuals wanting to train to become an EMT had to travel to Clovis three nights a week. She said having the program close will help in addressing the shortage of EMT regionally.

Hanna said students are already registering for the courses and class size is limited to 10 to 12 students.

Students will learn skills including

- Provide out of hospital emergency medical care and transportation for critical and emergent patients.

- Learn the basic knowledge and skills necessary to stabilize and safely transport patients.

- Perform interventions with basic equipment typically found on an ambulance.

Financial aid for the courses is

available for those who qualify and a scholarship is available for the courses as well. The scholarship applications are due Aug. 18.

# Police seek thief

# County commission to aid wind farm

The Quay County Commission took steps Monday to help an existing wind farm near House expand as part of a potential \$150 million injection into the local economy.

A pair of resolutions were introduced for industrial revenue bonds for both the current New Mexico Wind Energy Center and the proposed Casa Mesa Wind Project.

NextEra Energy Resources Project Director Christopher Cothran presented information about the company's proposed upgrades and new project

construction during the commission's regular meeting.

Cothran said the existing 1.5-megawatt turbines at the New Mexico Wind Energy Center are not producing up to their potential. He said the plan is to replace the existing blades on the turbines with larger blades to increase the productivity by 20 percent.

Cothran said this increased production will result in the county's intake from the project of up to \$107 million. He said existing infrastructure at the plant will support the larger blades.

Cothran said the leases with the land owners have already been renewed. He

said the company wants to ensure any land owner that has turbines on their property will be reimbursed for any property tax increase.

Cothran said the proposed Casa Mesa Wind project would be smaller than the NMWEC project but would include the newest technology and larger 2.5-megawatt turbines. He said the project would have 19 2.5-megawatt turbines and two 1.75-megawatt turbines.

This new project will also include new battery storage technology, Franklin McCasland, commission chair asked how the technology was new, and if there were any environmental concerns.

Cothran said the batteries are lithium ion storage units, which would not even be noticed and are a fairly new innovation in the industry. He said the wind farms can only generate 256 megawatts of power, and after 200 megawatts the energy would be sent to the batteries.

"This will allow us to continue to feed energy onto the grid when the wind is not turning (turbines)," Cothran added.

The county's share off the IRB's for this newest project will be more than \$48 million, said Richard Primrose, county manager.

Primrose said the House School District will benefit \$86,233 from the two proj-

ects scheduled for completion in 2018.

Cothran said this is just the first step in securing the ordinances from the county to proceed with the upgrades and new construction. He said the company will meet with school officials to discuss the projects.

"We are proud to work with this commission, who have been great stewards of the residents, land and resources of the county," Cothran said.

In other business at Monday's meeting:

■ The commission held a public hearing to discuss the Quay County Infrastructure/Capital Improvement Plan.

■ A public hearing was

held for the closure of Quay Road 51 from Blocks 3400 to 3750. Primrose said the closure is at the request of the landowner and the road does not lead to any state land. The closure was approved in open session.

■ Quay County Sheriff

Russell Shafer requested the construction of a fenced, canopied area in the current courthouse parking lot for the securing of transport vehicles after-hours. Shafer said there have been fuel thefts and vandalism of the vehicles that has cost the department/county money. The commission approved a contract with Pacheco Construction and Trucking Inc. for the construction at \$11,953.

# Local arrested on sex charges

TUCUMCARI — A Tucumcari man was arrested Monday on 23 felony charges connected to alleged criminal sexual penetration and criminal exploitation of girls ranging in age from 14 to 17.

Anthony Groomas, 29, was booked into the Quay County Detention Center on a \$15,000 cash only bond following his arrest, according to a release from New Mexico Attorney General Henry Balderas' office.

Groomas is charged with five counts of second-degree criminal sexual penetration, 12 counts of sexual exploitation of children (four for production, seven for manufacturing, one for possession), five counts of contributing to delinquency of a minor and one count of tampering with evidence.

It was not immediately known if Groomas had an attorney.

The time period of the

alleged crimes occurred between May 2015 and February, said James Hallinan, a spokesman for Balderas' office.

Hallinan said tips came from the National Center for Mission and Exploited Children.

Hallinan said through the course of the investigation social media conversations between Groomas and the minors were reviewed. He said additional interviews with the minors were con-

ducted.

Based on the information the AG's agents received they served a search warrant on Feb. 3 at Groomas' residence in Tucumcari where several electronic devices were taken into custody, Hallinan said.

"Protecting New Mexico's children from sexual predators is our highest priority and I am urging the public to come forward with any information they have about these charges or related offenses," Balderas said. "Whether you live in cities like Albuquerque or Las Cruces, or more rural areas like Quay County, parents must watch for signs of sexual predators soliciting their children and report it to authorities immediately."

stand and low yield.

Lauriault said the field was replanted but its yield and growth was weaker than the first. He said a dig into the soil revealed White-Fringed Beetles had burrowed into the roots of the alfalfa.

The WFB has since been reported in counties across Eastern New Mexico and in states including south eastern Texas, Arkansas and Louisiana.

"This particular species of beetle can be devastating to crops, including alfalfa, cotton, peanuts, soybean and (both) pecan (and) peach trees," said New Mexico State University Entomologist Carol Sutherland.

Sutherland was one of the NMSU faculty, researchers present at the field day. She said the beetle is dangerous for two reasons — first because it targets root systems, second because no pesticide is available to kill it.

Sutherland said experts are working on finding a way to address this newest problem for agricultural producers. She said for now, suppression by insecticides

and rotation of crops is the best course of action. The recommendation is to rotate the crops with a fibrous root crop such as varieties of wheat, grasses and sorghum.

Lauriault said by rotating the crops there are pesticide labeled for the crops and spraying may be more effective. He said one of the major concerns is that the WFB is a hitchhiker — getting onto harvested crops and catching a ride on the equipment used for a shorter trip to other crops.

Lauriault said currently the Ag Center is working on research along with Sutherland on introducing nematodes as a way to combat the WFB. He said a professor at Cornell University, Ithaca, New York, has been conducting research on nematodes that attack species of lava. The hope is that the nematodes will survive in New Mexico's soil and climate and attack the beetle larva.

"We are always working on some form of research that could have the potential

for a positive impact on the agricultural industry of our region and state," Lauriault said. "If the nematodes can be raised in this region then it could become a new niche industry for someone to start in the state."

Lauriault said the continued support of area farmers, ranchers and the communities of the region helps the center to continue to operate. He said with their support the center can continue to contribute valuable research to the agricultural industry.


incidents on the night of Aug. 7. Romero had escaped from a mental hospital in Pueblo, Colorado, and had been in the area for 17 months.

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**Is This a Graven Image?**

"Dear brother Clem: It bothers me to see drawings of Jesus, depicted much like statues seen in many parts of the world. Isn't this same thing as 'graven image' which God condemned in Moses' law? -C.G.,PA"

When God gave the law to Israel, through Moses, He said, "Thou shalt not make unto thee a graven image, nor any likeness of anything that is in heaven above, or that is in the earth beneath, or that is in the water under the earth. Thou shalt not bow down thyself unto them, nor serve them, for I Jehovah they God am a jealous God"(Exod.20:4-5)

As with most of the laws which God gave, He gave also the reason for it. He said "Don't make a likeness of anything...Do not bow down to them, nor serve them" God was not saying it was wrong to have a picture of your parents or of your children on your dresser in your bedroom. He is speaking of the "purpose" of these things. They are not to be used for worship, nor are we to assign that purpose for even a drawing of them.

Because of this prohibition in EXOD. 20:4-5, the country of Israel does not depict any person or animal on its coins. However they don't have the same compulsion when it comes to their currency, which usually carries the picture of some highly-place government official (much as we have here in the United States). It seems to me that we must look at the entire passage of the scripture in Exod.20:4-5, and not try to divorce the command from the reason for it. As long as we are not "worshipping" a picture (or the being it represents), I cannot see a violation. However, we must ever be careful that we do not "pray to a picture"(of the being it depicts). What we must always remember if the first of the Ten Commandments: "Thou shalt have no other gods before me" (Exod.20:3). ### VA system fails again with Gulf War veterans

They have yet to define it and haven't trained enough people to diagnose it. So it's little wonder the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs finds itself ill-equipped to deal with Gulf War Illness — a multi-symptom malady linked to military service in the Middle East and first identified in the early 1990s.

The VA estimates that about 44 percent of the 700,000 Gulf War veterans have symptoms associated with Gulf War Illness, or GWI. Yet given the lack of a definition and trained diagnosticians, it's also not surprising that veterans filing claims for disability compensation for Gulf War Illness are experiencing high rates of denial.

In 2015, the most recent year for which complete data are available, the local VA office turned down 92.5 percent of the 640 Gulf War illness claims it received — the ninth-highest denial rate in the nation. A June report from the Government Accountability Office says most of the 58 regional VA offices showed high denial rates, ranging from 100 percent in Alaska to 47 percent in Boston. Texas' denial rate was 90 percent.

Gulf War Illness, initially believed to have been caused by exposure to smoke from burn pits or oil well fires, has a frustratingly diverse set of medically unexplained symptoms that can include fatigue, headaches, joint pain, indigestion, insomnia, dizziness, respiratory disorders, skin disorders, menstrual issues and memory problems.

Because GWI symptoms range so widely, the VA has yet to develop uniform criteria for determining whether a veteran has it. (It bears noting that the Persian Gulf War, aka Operation Desert Shield, ended in 1991 and the VA has had around a quarter of a century to come up with a plan.)

Lacking a solid definition for GWI, medical examiners are predictably hamstrung when attempting to determine whether a veteran qualifies for disability payments. That in turn leads to the widely varying denial rates for the illness.

Currently, the VA offers its medical examiners a 90-minute online training course on GWI, but it's entirely voluntary. The report found that only about 10 percent of the VA's 4,000 medical examiners had completed the course as of February. Sonja Brown, acting associate director of the New Mexico VA Health Care System, didn't know how many medical examiners here have completed the course.

Meanwhile, thousands of Gulf War veterans whose mysterious ailments may or may not be due to their service are left in limbo regarding treatment and disability benefits.

It's just the latest way the VA system has failed our servicemen and women.

Back in 2014, allegations of a secret wait list of veterans at the VA medical center in Phoenix triggered a massive audit of more than 216 VA sites, including in New Mexico. Officials at the Raymond G. Murphy Veterans Affairs Medical Center in Albuquerque admitted in a conference call that year with Albuquerque Journal reporters and members of the state's congressional delegation that close to 3,000 patients were parked on a phantom wait list. The revelations fueled a scandal that led to the resignation of VA Secretary Eric Shinseki that May.

To its credit the VA agrees with the latest Government Accountability Office findings and recommendations. But to its discredit, it has done precious little to address them.

### Campbell's voice made him a star

I was never as much a Glen Campbell fan as I was a devotee of some of the people he was associated with.

Glen Campbell's death on Aug. 8 was significant to me, though. I followed his hits during my young adulthood and eventually recognized what a consummate musician he was.

Early on, I was impressed with the songs he performed, and their writers.

Mostly for me that was Jimmy Webb. Aside from Campbell's megahits, "By the Time I Get to Phoenix," "Wichita Lineman," and "Galveston," Webb also wrote "Up, Up and Away," and "MacArthur Park," as well as several other hits for other artists.

Webb made heavy, and effective, use of the 11th chord, which has an air of comfortable suspense, dark like a minor chord but expectant.

I was a budding musician back then, not that I ever really flowered, and learned through Webb how versatile that chord can be.

Dolly Parton, among those who commented on Campbell's passing, also mentioned that Campbell was a virtuoso guitarist.

I saw that about 10 years ago when, as an accidental recipient of tickets, I heard him play at the Hollywood Bowl. He played several solos on guitar that evening, and I heard in his playing a gift for extremely melodic improvisation.

If he had not discovered his

singing voice, however, I'm not sure how well known he would have been outside the world of guitarists and studio musicians.

His playing reminds me of Django Reinhardt, a legendary improviser of the 1930s who composed intricate melodies on the spot and played them flawlessly on guitar. I don't think Reinhardt was ever a household name, though.

How many people know who Joe Satriani or Joe Bonamassa are? They are nearly worshipped by other guitarists, but they're not household names, either.

Campbell became one.

None of the obituaries of Campbell that I read mentioned that he was part of the Wrecking Crew, the studio musicians behind most of the hits of the 1960s and 1970s.

They were the Tijuana Brass behind Herb Alpert, the

band behind the Monkees, the instruments behind the Beach Boys. Even Frank Sinatra and Dean Martin used them on a few numbers.

Campbell joined luminaries like Leon Russell, who wrote "Masquerade" and organized Joe Cocker's "Mad Dogs and Englishmen" tour of the 1970s, and Dr. John, the New Orleans blues master, on the Wrecking Crew.

Like jazz pianist Nat King Cole ("Unforgettable") and a classic version of "Get Your Kicks on Route 66"), however, Campbell learned he had a voice and used it to stake a claim on immortality.

### Russia 'disturbance' was no hack

When the Obama administration CIA Director John Brennan testified before congressional committees over the last few months he informed them that he presided over a vast web of telecommunication networks that monitored Americans doing business in Russia.

Some of these business people were inadvertently communicating with suspected Russian intelligence agents.

At some point Brennan would feel a "disturbance in the force" and notify the FBI to investigate the American citizens who created the disturbance.

A short list of companies doing business in Russia includes Boeing, Ford, PepsiCo, Procter & Gamble, McDonald's, General Motors, Johnson & Johnson, Cargill, Alcoa, General Electric and Morgan Stanley.

Evidently, no one from any

of these organizations communicated with any Russian ambassadors, politicians, bankers, entrepreneurs, oligarchs, or other assorted Russian hangers on who even knew who Vladimir Putin was.

On the other hand, any associate of Donald Trump who ever dialed "Information" seeking the number of the Russian Chamber of Commerce finds themselves under investigation.

No less a journalist than Pulitzer Prize winner Seymour Hersh appears to be on Trump's side on this issue,

claiming that Trump is a victim of "disinformation" at the hands of a "Brennan operation." Hersh goes on to claim the press has served as a shameful stenographer for Brennan to smear Trump.

Brennan apparently was auditioning for the CIA director job in a Clinton administration.

The investigation into the hack of Democratic National Committee's system is also drawing some belated questions. A wide-ranging article in "The Nation" by Patrick Lawrence claims "there was no hack of the Democratic National Committee's system on July 5 last year — not by the Russians, not by anyone else."

Lawrence quotes an organization called Veteran Intelligence Professionals for Sanity (VIPS). This group is made up of forensic investigators with technical, national security and geopolitical

experience. Lawrence's lengthy article covers all aspects of the so called hack, but two things he finds are telling.

First, a forensics investigator wrote, "that metadata was deliberately altered and documents were deliberately pasted into a Russianified Word document with Russian language settings and style headings." And secondly, "On the evening of July 5, 2016, 1,976 megabytes of data were downloaded from the DNC's server. The operation took 87 seconds."

This transfer rate of 22.7 megabytes per second could not have been accomplished without the use of a thumb drive and had to be downloaded at the computer.

It was a leak, not a hack.

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

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

"I remember Adrian, he played as a receiver and in the

defensive secondary," said John Span, Rattlers assistant football coach.

Span said Jones was a good player who loved to play the game. He said Jones has a football background but will have to adjust to the speed of the 6-man game.

Jones said since the start of two-a-days the team has been going all out with the same

drive and goal, to defend and win back-to-back championships. He said the seniors have stepping up to take the place of those leaders lost to graduation.

"The reception by the team, faculty and community has been great," Jones said. "It's not going to be an easy task knowing they are the defending state champions.

However, I believe in the abilities of these athletes and look forward to what the season will bring."

San Jon, a playoff contender in six-man since 2011, added Grady to the fold in 2012.

Following the co-op, the Coyotes improved, but after losing one quarterfinal and three semifinals games the prize seemed just out of reach.

In the 2015 six man state semifinals, the Coyotes (7-1 4-0), lost their sole game of the season to the Floyd Broncos (5-4, 2-2), a team they had beaten 60-32 two weeks prior.

San Jon entered last year's playoffs as the second seed, and got a favorable bracket when seventh-seeded Lake Arthur upset top-seeded Animas.

## City to buy paving machine

The Tucumcari City Commission Thursday decided to purchase a "hot mix" paving machine that city officials say will result in more permanent repairs of potholes in city streets. The machine's \$94,000 price will come from city capital outlay funds, City Manager Jared Langenegger told the commission. It will be able to combine aggregate rock with old millings and chunks of old asphalt to produce "hot mix" asphalt to repair potholes.

Langenegger said hot mix seals better to create a more permanent patch than "cold mix" patching material. The cold mix, he said, often will be "washed away in the next rain storm." The hot-mix machine, he said, will be able to produce a half-ton of patching material in eight to 15 minutes. The commission also: Voted to spend \$95,000 to install more than 1,000 feet of 8-inch sewer pipe under I-40 from a lift station near the KOA campground south of Interstate 40, to another lift station near Historic Route 66. The new

pipe will replace one that collapsed, and will result in better water flow to the city's wastewater treatment plant, City Manager Jared Langenegger said. Approved an \$8,600 contract with Pacheo Construction to clean up soil at Date Street and East McGee Avenue after a sewer-drain backup July 31 caused flooding that contaminated soil near the intersection with petroleum products. At a public work session before the regular meeting, the commission: Discussed demolition of

abandoned houses in the city. District 1 Commissioner Ralph Moya passed photos of houses in his district that he said should be demolished. Heard a proposal from Langenegger that the city establish special zoning for farmland and open field properties on the city's borders as a way of avoiding the need to enforce ordinances that require clean-up of mesquite and other weeds. Langenegger said the zoning would be an alternative to "de-annexing" the land, which would remove it from city jurisdiction.

## City considers recycling business

The city of Tucumcari wants to explore the tire-recycling business. The Tucumcari City Commission Thursday unanimously authorized a task force of business people to study the feasibility of a city-owned tire recycling plant. Task force members include Jim Hudson, owner of Hudson's Auto Supply; Nittin

Bhakta, who operates several motels in the city; and Leif Gray, owner of Quality Lube and Tire. Fifth District Commissioner Todd Duplantis, who proposed the idea to the commission, is also on the task force. Duplantis proposed the idea during a work session that preceded Thursday's regular commission meeting and later in the regular session. Recycled tires can be

shredded and processed for use in road construction materials, highway markers, as an ingredient in polystyrene plastics and even fuel, he said. Duplantis said an investment of about \$800,000 in plant equipment and property could bring in revenues of about \$2 million a year for the city. With the nearest tire recycling operation located in Houston, Duplantis said, there should be plenty of markets in

Colorado, Texas, and Arizona a tire recycling plant in Tucumcari could serve. Duplantis said the city's processing operation could supply other businesses that would make products from shredded and granulated tire pieces. "I'd like to see the city start earning money on its own," Duplantis said. "We could do much more to clean up properties and fix our streets."

# Dora superintendent placed on paid leave

**DORA** — School board members in Dora on Monday night voted to place Superintendent Steve Barron on paid administrative leave.

None of the four board members opposed the motion. Barron was not at the meeting.

About 75 Dora-area residents attended the meeting, held less than two weeks after community members began calling for the resignations of Barron and school board members.

The actions came after a June audit conducted by the state auditor identified more than \$100,000 in potential mismanaged funds over a three-year period.

A criminal investigation has been launched, though no arrests have been made in

connection with the case.

Board members went into executive session for about 45 minutes during Monday's meeting, before voting to place Barron on leave.

Barron, reached on his cell phone after the vote, declined comment, but he said he is looking forward to the end of the ordeal so he can "tell you the truth. Because what's been said about this whole deal is not the truth."

Audience members told The News that school board member Gary William Simpson attended Monday's meeting, but he did not sit with board members or participate in the executive session. No explanation was announced. The meeting continued at The News deadline.





# Victoria Martens' mother to be first tried

**ALBUQUERQUE** — Michelle Martens will be the first of three defendants to go to trial on charges connected to the rape and murder of her 10-year-old daughter, Victoria.

Martens' trial, which is expected to last three to four weeks, is scheduled for July 2018.

Fabian Gonzales will go to trial in October 2018, and Jessica Kelley's trial is scheduled for January 2019. Gonzales was Michelle Martens' boyfriend and Kelley is his

cousin.

Second Judicial District Judge Charles Brown ruled in May that each defendant would be tried separately.

During a hearing Monday, Brown also set deadlines for plea agreements, but defense attorney Gary Mitchell, who is representing Martens, said he did not believe any of the defendants would take a deal.

"State's not going to make any offer that's reasonable, and we're not going to accept anything unreasonable," Mitchell said. "I don't see any chance of resolving this case."

The first trial was originally scheduled for October of this year, but attorneys argued that taking an "unusually complex" case to trial so quickly - as required by the court's Case Management Order - might put their clients' constitutional rights in jeopardy.

Brown said Chief Judge Nan Nash agreed to sign an order declaring that there were exceptional circumstances in the case, which let Brown push the trial dates back by several months.

Prosecutor Greer Rose said Martens should go to trial first, because litigation in the her case could impact the remaining two trials. She also said the mother's case would be the "biggest, longest, most complicated one."

The trials are still expected to take place in Bernalillo County, despite requests from defense attorneys to move them outside of the county.

Brown said that if in any of the three trials attorneys are unable to find a fair and impartial jury, he will consider changing the venue.

According to police, the girl was sexually assaulted, strangled and dismembered in her mother's West Side apartment.

She was found dead Aug. 24, 2016.

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


