Logan teacher files suit against state

Angela Medrow: PED is violating teachers' rights with sick leave.

A class action lawsuit has been filed by a Logan School teacher against the New Mexico Public Education Department regarding the law that punishes teachers for using sick and personal leave.

Heather Skandera, New Mexico secretary of education, confirmed Monday that her department has received the suit and is reviewing it but offered no further comment.

The class action suit was filed on March 30 in the First District Court in Santa Fe on behalf of Angela Medrow and all teachers in the state, said Logan attorney Warren Frost, who is representing Medrow.

"The state is taking teachers' sick leave for their own benefit to save money, while not compensating them for it," Frost said. "This action violates the New Mexico Constitution."

The long-contested system allows teachers only three

sick days before they are docked 10 points on their evaluation, with 50 percent of the evaluation being based on student performances on standardized tests.

Gov. Susana Martinez vetoed House Bill 241 last month, which would have allowed teachers to take more than three days of annual sick leave without being hurt on performance evaluations. Martinez said the bill threatened to reverse recent reductions in teacher absentee rates and to increase the use of substitutes in classrooms, which would compromise school budgets and academic performance.

A veto override initiated

by Sen. Craig Brandt failed to collect enough votes.

The bill would have added language to the School Personnel Act that would prevent teacher sick or personal leave days from negatively affecting their annual performance evaluations, allowing teachers to use 10 days of sick leave.

Martinez announced on April 3 that her administration would make changes to the teacher evaluation system where a teacher could miss six days instead of three, and student scores would now count for 35 percent of the evaluations.

"We've earned those days; the whole issue is insulting,"

Medrow said. "They should value teachers more."

She said the issue with the sick and personal leave raises a health concern for teachers and the students, because teachers are inclined to come to school even when sick.

Frost said the injunction being sought is not just for Medrow but for all New Mexico school teachers who have been and continued to be punished by the PED for using their sick leave and personal leave.

"These teachers have a contractual right to their sick and personal leave," Frost said. "New Mexico's current

Commissioners consider opposing borehole project

Robert Lumpkin says project could lead to nuclear waste repository.

The Tucumcari city commissioners tabled a resolution Thursday that would oppose a proposed three-mile-deep borehole project at Nara Visa.

Bidding contractors and the U.S. Department of Energy

say the borehole will be drilled only to test boreholes as being plausible as a means to eventually store highly radioactive nuclear waste.

The project contractors and the DOE have made numerous statements that the test borehole will not be a waste repository site.

Borehole opponents say the

DOE will not guarantee that any site will be ruled out as a waste repository site.

A public workshop before the regular city commission meeting Thursday included discussion on the project.

Mayor Pro Tem Robert Lumpkin proposed the resolution to oppose the borehole project, because it "could be the first step in the siting of a nuclear waste repository in Quay County," which would be at odds with the city's plan-

ning goals, according to the text of the resolution.

Discussion at the workshop centered on whether the borehole at Nara Visa could become a nuclear waste repository.

Borehole opponents Ed Hughs, a Las Cruces resident with family members living in the Nara Visa area, and Bart Wyatt, a Nara Visa rancher, urged commissioners to vote to oppose the project, saying they believe the test borehole

could become a nuclear waste disposal site.

Hughs and Wyatt said that based on documents they brought with them, the deep granite rock at Nara Visa makes it among the few places in the nation that the DOE would consider suitable for a nuclear waste repository.

They also said the DOE's search for a repository site is

Governor signs bill to protect tow truck drivers

Bobby Unruh was killed by a passing car while towing a vehicle.

The recent passing of

"Bobby's Law" will help to protect the lives of tow truck operators like Bobby Unruh, according to a spokesperson for Gov. Susana Martinez.

Unruh, 37, of Tucumcari was killed on Feb. 19, at mile marker 318 on I-40 near Montoya while attempting to tow a commercial vehicle.

Senate Bill 76 was signed into law on April 6 by Martinez.

"The governor signed it, because it will keep our fam-

ilies safer on our highways," said Michael Lonergan with the governor's office. "With this bill, it's now crystal clear that motorists cannot drive in a lane adjacent to a vehicle on the side of the road with its lights flashing. By doing so, we're better protecting our emergency responders and tow truck drivers."

The law imposes criminal sanctions to include jail time.

"Every operator of a motor vehicle in the state of New Mexico is charged with the civil duty to exercise due care," said Unruh's mother, Linda Unruh, in a written statement. "Bobby's Law would, in addition to civil sanctions, impose criminal sanctions for failure to pull over to the inside lane when encountering a vehicle

evaluation system punishes them and takes points away if they use their leave.”

Teachers that use their six-day leave are placed in danger of negative impact if they miss any more days, Medrow said, and they don't know what is going to happen for the rest of the year. Sick or personal days could also be needed to care for a sick child, spouse or parent, she added.

“Teachers serve in one of

the most stressful jobs, and it's made harder by the administrative sick leave penalty that does not improve student success,” Betty Patterson, National Education Association-New Mexico president and a special education teacher said in a press release. “It remains wrong to devalue teaching done when an educator is healthy simply because, like other human beings, they or their own children may be sick from time-to-time,” Patterson said. “Whether it is three or six days of sick leave being used in evaluation, it is punitive and demoralizing.”

Frost said there are five levels in the teacher evaluation system, if a teacher is in the top three levels, they are fine but should a teacher fall into the bottom two levels because of docked points for missed days and their students' performance is not satisfactory, they are fired.

“Those 10 points can make a lot of difference in a teacher's evaluation and having or not having a job,” Frost said. “With the (governor's) veto the state is saying if teachers use the benefits they are contractually guaranteed, they will be punished for it.”

becoming urgent as states where nuclear waste is currently being stored are preparing to fine the DOE for missing deadlines to establish a high-level nuclear waste repository.

District 1 Commissioner Ralph Moya repeatedly interrupted Hughs and Wyatt, say-

ing their statements were based on speculation.

“I don't want speculation,” he said. “I want facts.”

During the regular commission meeting, Moya said he does not have an opinion one way or another on the borehole issue, but he wants to see better evidence to support either side.

Commissioner Todd Duplantis, District 5, said he would like to draft a new resolution that would oppose the

siting of a nuclear waste repository in Quay County but would not rule out the test borehole.

Cyndi Wyatt, Bart Wyatt's wife, said Nara Visa area representatives are seeking wide support for their opposition to the borehole because rewarding of the contract to drill the borehole, like the licensing of a waste repository site, requires local consent.

The DOE could not be reached for comments.

parked or disabled on the outside of the road. The law would be for the protection of motorists and tow truck employees they employ.”

Senate Bill 76 says that motor vehicles traveling on state or interstate highways are required to move over or slow down for certain vehicles flashing emergency or

hazard lights, including recovery or repair vehicles.

“The recovery vehicle standing on a highway for the purpose of removing, and actually engaged in removing, a disabled vehicle and while engaged in towing a disabled vehicle may display flashing lights,” the bill reads.

Drivers approaching a stationary authorized emergency or recovery vehicle displaying flashing lights have to drive in a lane not

adjacent to the stationary vehicle, decrease the speed of their vehicle and proceed with caution when it is “reasonable” to do so.

“I believe any motorist or trucker to include law enforcement, ambulance operators, tow truck workers and a vacationer with a flat tire should be protected when upon public highways from heedless, wanton acts of other drivers,” said Linda Unruh. “Bobby did not have to die.”

Setting it Straight

A story in last week's Quay County Sun should have clarified that there were three people involved in the incident that resulted in the death of 17-year-old Patrick Gonzales. A 20-year-old accidentally shot and killed Gonzales and injured a 15-year-old, according to District Attorney Tim Rose. No one was charged in the death of Gonzales. Rose said the case will be sent to the Attorney General's Office where the final decision will be made regarding criminal charges.

Meetings watch

The Eastern Plains Council of Governments board of directors met Wednesday morning at the EPCOG office at 418 Main Street in Clovis.

The board met for two hours. The following took place during the meeting:

■ Clyde Hudson of USDA Rural Development spoke on the administration's rural development funding programs and gave everybody at the meeting a cheat sheet of grants, loans and assistance programs offered in the areas of housing, community and business.

“We have a program for just about anything you want to do,” Hudson said.

He said the change in presidential administrations would be a gradual process for USDA. He noted Eric Vigil was acting state director and would likely be there for a few months while positions are nominated and filled top-down.

Regarding a question on President Donald Trump's submitted budget, Hudson said he wasn't the person to talk to on the matter but did

say the budget is always a long negotiating process.

■ The council reported it has spent 85 percent of its year's budget with the year 75 percent finished. Executive Director Sandy Chancey noted EPCOG had paid for many of its major expenses and is still expecting revenue from its administration of grants for various municipalities.

Raymond Mondragon of EPCOG said he had put in for a potential \$20,000 grant from the New Mexico Gas Company, but that potential award would go on the 2017-18 budget.

Justin Bennett of Union County asked how the council's financial picture would affect its ability to attend a possible special session of the state Legislature.

“We will find a way to get there,” Chancey said. “From our understanding, (a special session is) a given; it just hasn't been scheduled.”

■ Mondragon reported on the Eastern New Mexico Spring Job Fair set for 3

p.m.-7 p.m. Thursday at the Clovis Civic Center.

The job fair is in its fifth year, and about 45 vendors are slated to have booths.

The fair is funded with help from the city of Clovis (\$3,500), Curry County (\$1,400) and the \$35 booth rentals. Mondragon said 480 people came to last year's fair and 110 of them were hired.

■ Jose Griego of Clovis spoke during the public comments section. He noted he had acquired the Puerto de Luna courthouse in Guadalupe County. The courthouse, which hasn't been operational in more than 30 years, was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1987.

Griego said any renovations planned would happen with the approval of the community, and that initial plans pointed toward a museum and research center.

■ The board scheduled the EPCOG annual meeting for June 28 in Clayton.

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Meetings watch

Commissioners took the following actions during the Tucumcari City Commission meeting on Thursday:

- Approved a grant application for about \$207,800 from the New Mexico Aging and Long-Term Services Department to make repairs on Tucumcari's 41-year-old senior center, as presented by Mary Ann Dominguez, senior center director. The grant would cover repairs to electrical systems, kitchen upgrades, safety equipment on a walk-in freezer, construction of a pantry and paving of the senior center's parking lot.
- Approved A \$30,000 expenditure of Lodgers' Tax funds to construct a disk golf course at Five Mile Park, east of the city. City Manager Jared Langenegger said the proposed 18-hole course is likely to host regional disk golf tournaments. Construction is expected to be complete by June 1, he said.
- Added about \$24,000 to include a drainage study as part of planning for sidewalk improvements downtown. The additional study brings the total contract amount for engineering sidewalk improvement services from Consensus

Planning, Albuquerque, to about \$89,700, according to contract documents. The program is funded by the Great Blocks on Main Street program of the New Mexico Main Street program, sponsored by the New Mexico Economic Development Department.

- Approved a contract for engineering utility re-installations made necessary by a proposed resurfacing of Second Street downtown. The \$65,000 contract is with Bohannon Huston, Albuquerque.
- Approved a change order for the Center Street water tank construction project that decreases the cost of tank construction by \$49,500 but adding 110 days to the construction time. The change results from a change in supplier of the glass-lined water tank. The new supplier is Aquastore of Sherman, Texas, instead of Engineering America, Inc./Permastore, based in England. The change was made to accommodate federal Environmental Protection Agency rules that require U.S.-based suppliers for water tanks for grant-funded water projects like the Center Street project. The \$1.3 million Center

Street project is funded by an EPA grant.

- Increased city funding for the city's MainStreet organization from \$35,000 to \$45,000 from May 1 to April 30, 2018.
- Authorized the city's community development department to seek \$500,000 in Community Development Block Grant funds through the New Mexico Department of Finance and Administration. The grant would cover costs associated with Aber Addition water and street improvements. The Aber Addition is located on the city's east side.
- Delayed a decision on whether to allow Paws and Claws Animal Rescue, a non-profit that shelters animals captured by the city's animal control department, to purchase city property. The commission decided the property must be appraised and bidders sought in order to sell the property. The city allows the animal rescue organization to use the city property near Railroad Avenue and Historic Route 66 Boulevard for rescue and euthanasia services, for which the city pays Paws and Claws about \$12,000 a year.

An election to determine whether to recall three of Tucumcari's five commissioners will be held June 13, according to Tucumcari City Clerk Angelica Gray. Election day voting will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Tucumcari Convention Center, 1500 W. Route 66 Blvd. The commissioners facing recall are Ralph Moya, District 1; Amy Gutierrez, District 2; and Mayor Ruth Ann Litchfield, District 3.

A petition to recall Mayor Pro Tem Robert Lumpkin, District 4, failed to receive enough valid signatures to qualify for a recall vote.

Commissioner Todd Duplantis, District 5, was appointed to the commission March 29 to replace John Mihm, who died in December.

Early voting for the recall election will be held from May 24 to June 9 via an electronic vote tabulator at Tucumcari City Hall, 215 E. Center St.

Applications for absentee ballots must be completed and accepted by the city clerk's office before 5 p.m. on June 9.

Voters who are not currently registered must register by 5 p.m. May 16 to be eligible to vote in the recall election.

Voters residing in the districts in which commissioners are subject to the recall may vote only on whether to recall the commissioner for their own district.

"Dear brother Clem: I would like for you to explain more on the subject of no music in the church. I know it says to make melody with the heart, but you can do that with music."

Actually, we do have music in our worship, but it is vocal music----- singing. That is what the Lord commanded, and that is what we do. Many prefer instrumental music, but that is not what the Lord authorized. And our worship is to please God, not ourselves. The instrument we are to use is the heart: "Speaking one to another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing, and making melody with your heart to the Lord" (Eph. 5:19).

Many ask, "What difference does it make?" But the answer to that is on nearly every page of the Scriptures. God speaks to us in His word to guide us. To ignore what he says and establish our own system of worship is not being obedient to Him. Nadab and Abihu, sons of the High Priest, Aaron, offered "strange fire before the Lord, which he did not command" (Leb: 10:1-2). The Lord put them to death for it. That is the difference it makes. If we worship as we desire, ignoring what God has said, that is a sin of presumption, doing what we want instead of what God wants. As the psalmist wrote "keep back Thy servant from presumptuous sins; let them not rule me" (Psa. 19:13).

The simple answer to your question, then, is that we must worship as God directs us. To and instruments to the worship, which He has given us, is not authorized by Him. If anyone could find authority for instrumental music in the worship of the New Testament church, they would have come forward long ago. They did not, for it is not there. We don't use instruments because God did not authorize them to be used.

New UNM coach makes impression

First impressions matter, and Paul Weir certainly made a memorable one when he was introduced last week as the new University of New Mexico head basketball coach.

Meticulously dressed, well-spoken — and surprisingly humble for a guy who just landed the plumb coaching job in the state, Weir graciously stepped into what is likely to be the toughest coaching job he's ever had.

For starters, Weir comes to Loboland from Aggieville, UNM's big-time downstate rival in all things athletic. That "defection" will no doubt play out vociferously when the Lobos take on New Mexico State University on Nov. 17 in Las Cruces' Pan Am Center.

And Weir is stepping over to a 17-win, 14-loss team that has been hemorrhaging players.

Meanwhile, UNM's athletic department is hemorrhaging money, posting a \$1.54 million deficit last fiscal year, and owing the man Weir replaces, Craig Neal, a \$1 million buy-out.

To lure Weir to UNM, Athletics Director Paul Krebs offered the new coach an unusual six-year deal with a beginning salary of \$625,000 — more than double what he was making at NMSU — that will grow to \$825,000 by 2022-23. Still, from Krebs' point of view, that's a bargain compared to Neal's annual base salary and compensation of \$950,000 a season.

But the 37-year-old Toronto native, who had been the Aggies' assistant coach for nine years and head coach for only one, has some impressive credentials.

This past season, Weir's Aggies beat UNM in Las Cruces for the first time in eight years and won a true road game at a Power 5 school (at Pac-12's Arizona State) for the first time in more than 20 seasons while stringing together a 20-game win streak.

Weir joined Lou Henson, his longtime mentor, as the only NMSU rookie head coach to take the Aggies to the NCAA Tournament. Overall, Weir's Aggies went 28-6 last season.

But back to first impressions. Traditionally, when a new Lobo coach is introduced, he's given, and dons, a cherry red blazer that not only reflects half of the teams' cherry and silver colors, but has become iconic sidelines attire.

But when Krebs handed Weir the celebratory coat, the new coach declined to put it on.

"I told them I hadn't earned it yet," Weir explained. "That's for me to do now. I've got to find a way to win some games."

It was a classy move, totally lacking the hollow bravado so many coaches insist on demonstrating at every opportunity.

Welcome to Loboland, Coach Weir.

Just read in the New York Times that a high-ranking official in the Obama administration ordered many different branches of the Intelligence Community to initiate electronic surveillance on all the communication equipment in Trump Tower. Although they found nothing, surveillance continues. This is McCarthyism on steroids!"

Comes now a Washington Post story headlined, "FBI obtained

FISA warrant to monitor former Trump adviser Carter Page."

The story begins, "The FBI obtained a secret court order last summer to monitor the communications of an adviser to presidential candidate Donald Trump, part of an investigation into possible links between Russia and the campaign, law enforcement and other U.S. officials said."

Last summer the conventional wisdom was that Hillary would win easily against any Republican and the Clinton campaign's Republican of choice was Donald Trump. Is it possible that the Clinton campaign with its ties to Obama sought to use the FISA courts against a political opponent?

If you believe what you read in the Washington Post, the intelligence community accused Carter Page of spying for Russia in their application to the

The song mentioned above and the sign of Jonah mention where Jesus would be in the grave (dark domain, heart of the Earth) and the sign of Jonah says for how long (three days and three nights - Matthew 12:39-40).

Jesus is God and when God speaks of a day, whether a specific date or a timeframe, he means a literal 24-hour period with a definite beginning and end (Genesis 1:1-2:3; Exodus 20:8-11; Acts 17:31). When it comes to how long Jesus was in the grave, you cannot account for three days AND three nights (or even three parts of both) and have Jesus crucified on Friday and arise on Sunday morning. To be raised on Sunday, Jesus had to die and be buried on Thursday. So, how can we know this?

John 19:28-42 describes Jesus' death and burial. The

law required that he had to be buried the day he died because he'd been hung on a tree (Deuteronomy 21:22-23; 1 Peter 2:21-24). Did you notice from John 19:31 that the day Jesus died and was buried was a day of preparation for a special Sabbath or a high day to follow?

The Passover began at twilight on the 14th day of the first month of the Jewish calendar and went through the next evening. They had the Last Supper on Wednesday evening and Jesus died before the 24-hour period was over on Thursday (Exodus 12:1-11). The 15th day of that month, beginning

at twilight, was a special Sabbath (a holy convocation) that began the seven-day Feast of Unleavened Bread (Leviticus 23:4-8). It didn't matter what day of the week that fell on, but Passover was always the day of preparation for special Sabbath. Everyone accepts Saturday as the Sabbath that was celebrated each week, as you read from Exodus 20.

Consequently, Jesus was crucified on Thursday, Friday was the special Sabbath, Saturday was regular weekly Sabbath, and Sunday, the first day of the week, was the third day with three intervening nights after he died

and was buried. Since Jesus arose on the first day of the week, Sunday became the day on which the early church met each week to remember Jesus' death, burial and resurrection and to take part in the other components of corporate worship (Galatians 2:20-3:2; Romans 6:3-7, 17-18; Acts 20:7; 2:42; 1 Corinthians 10:17-34; 16:1-2).

Does the church you attend follow the example of the early church in regard to initial obedience and worship?

City Manager addresses commissioners, public on recent issues

Breaking with usual city commission business Thursday, Tucumcari City Manager Jared Langenegger read a 12-page response to criticisms leveled at the city by those sponsoring a recall of three city commissioners.

A recall special election will be held June 13.

Instead of his usual report on events and developments, Langenegger read a statement describing actions designed to help reverse the city's economic decline that commissioners and city administration have taken since he became city manager two and a half years ago.

The statement also accused Keith and Corrine Hayes — the couple who coordinated the recall petition — of using "half-truths and misinformation" to advance the recall.

"The Hayes are hiding behind a veil of misinformation and innuendo to avoid having to comply with the nuisance ordinance and clean their property," Langenegger said. "Their

actions, in my opinion, are quite frankly despicable."

Much of Langenegger's statement Thursday countered assertions made in letters and advertisements that the Hayes have sent to Tucumcari residents and the Quay County Sun. The letter to the Quay County Sun did not comply with the newspaper's letters-to-the-editor policy and was not published.

He said the Hayes family has said the city should focus on economic development instead of weeds and vacant buildings, but keeping up appearances in town contributes to economic development

"If your community is not aesthetically pleasing, individuals will not want to move to your community," he said. "Aside from aesthetics, there are safety and health concerns that come along with vacant buildings and overgrown lots."

Langenegger said other business owners and families are making corrections to comply with the nuisance ordinance, and it would be unfair to these people for city government "to simply turn our heads away from the Hayes' property."

The following were other issues Langenegger addressed regarding accusations made by the Hayes family:

■ Regarding letters being sent to citizens and the newspaper, Langenegger said the Hayes attack city economic development efforts, but the city has obtained Local Economic Development Act funds for many local business projects, including Tucumcari Mountain Cheese Factory and 3D Tools — a project also attacked by the Hayes.

"They have completed the manufacturing process for all of the parts, and they will now be shipped within the next two weeks," Langenegger said of 3D Tools, which will manufacture snow shovels that tilt to act as snowplows.

■ The Hayes also said the city should focus on improving its workforce instead of worrying about weeds and vacant buildings, said Langenegger, adding that the city and the Greater Tucumcari Economic Development Corporation have been working with a program to certify Quay County as a Work Ready Community by qualifying

employees, students and job seekers for National Career Readiness Certificates.

■ In a March 29 advertisement published in the Quay County Sun, the Hayes pointed out problems with street maintenance and leaks in water and sewer lines, as well as roof leaks at City Hall, according to Langenegger, who said the city has paved 30 blocks and has applied for Community Development Block Grant funding for more paving projects.

In addition, he said, the city has chisealed some streets near Washington Avenue on the city's south side.

Langenegger pointed out that there is always more infrastructure work to be done than money in the bank.

"Our particular situation is exacerbated by the fact that we are maintaining an infrastructure that was built for 10,000 people with only a population of 5,000 paying taxes to maintain it," he said.

■ Regarding the Hayes expressing concerns over city personnel policies, Langenegger said a city employee was denied a

vacation request after exhausting allowable leave time.

■ Langenegger also denied the Hayes' claim that city ambulances do not respond to out-of-town calls.

"We do have a lot of work to do to get back to being a Blue Ribbon City," he said, "but with persistence, we'll get there."

After Thursday's meeting, Keith Hayes said

Langenegger's comments were "a lot of blue sky."

"A lot of it (Langenegger's comments) does not pertain to Tucumcari in general," he said, adding that many residents are displeased with the city's interference on their personal properties.

People are "not happy when the city manager has work done around a buddy's house with city crews," he said.

Langenegger denied the accusation, saying Hayes may have been referring to community clean-up activities at some properties that involved volunteers, including city employees.

maintain two wind generation facilities (collectively, "SPS Wind Facilities"): the "Sagamore Wind Project" a 522 megawatt ("MW") wind generating plant and associated facilities in Roosevelt County, New Mexico and the "Hale Wind Project" a 478 MW wind generating plant and associated facilities located in Hale County, Texas. SPS is proposing to develop and own the SPS Wind Facilities to take advantage of the federal Production Tax Credits ("PTC") associated with those facilities for the benefit of its customers. The New Mexico site is being purchased from Invenery and the Texas site is being purchased from Nextera. In connection with the development of the SPS Wind Facilities, SPS is proposing to enter into a 30-year power purchase agreement ("PPA") with Bonita Wind Energy, LLC ("Bonita"), an affiliate of Nextera, for an additional 230 MW of wind generation output from three wind facilities in Texas. SPS projects that the combination of PTCs and fuel savings will lead to approximately \$2.8 billion in overall energy cost savings over the service lives of the SPS Wind Facilities and the Bonita PPA, with New Mexico retail customers receiving approximately \$638 million of those savings.

2. SPS's Application requests that the Commission:

a. Find it is in the public interest and consistent with Sections 62-6-12 (A)(4) and 62-6-13 of the Public Utility Act for SPS to purchase the Sagamore and Hale sites, which will be the locations of the SPS Wind Facilities;

b. Issue a Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity authorizing the construction, operation, and maintenance of the SPS Wind Facilities, and authorize SPS to accrue an allowance for funds used during construction;

c. Approve SPS's proposal to recover costs for the Sagamore Wind Project between the date the project begins commercial operation and the date the full investment in the project is included in rate base in a Commission rate case;

d. As part of the recovery of costs for the Sagamore Wind Project for the period before its full investment is included in rate base, allow SPS to record unused PTCs in a deferred tax asset that will be included in rate base;

e. Approve an energy-based methodology to allocate the costs of the SPS Wind Facilities among jurisdictions;

f. Approve a depreciation rate for production-related SPS Wind Facilities of 4.34%, which reflects a 25-year service life and a negative 8.5% net salvage value;

g. For purposes of calculating SPS's base rate revenue requirement during the period between the date that the SPS Wind Facilities are included in rate base and December 31, 2025, allow SPS to include in rate base the deferred tax asset that results from unused PTCs;

h. Confirm that SPS will be allowed to flow the value of the PTCs to its customers through its

fuel and purchased power cost adjustment clause after the SPS Wind Facilities are included in rate base;

i. Approve SPS's proposal to treat the revenue from the sale of Renewable Energy Certificates generated from the SPS Wind Facilities as off-system sales in which SPS retains 10% of the margins;

j. Find that SPS's transactions with an affiliate, Capital Services, LLC to purchase turbines for the SPS Wind Facilities is a reasonable Class I transaction under Section 62-6-19(B)(1) of the Public Utility Act and Commission Rule 17.6.450 NMAC;

k. Find that it is reasonable and consistent with Commission Rule 17.9.551 NMAC for SPS to enter into the Bonita PPA;

l. To enable SPS to complete construction of the SPS Wind facilities in time to meet the deadline for claiming 100% of the value of the PTCs for the benefit of customers, approve a procedural schedule that will allow SPS to obtain a final order as soon as practicable, but not later than December 31, 2017; and

m. Grant to SPS such other approvals, authorizations, and relief as the Commission deems necessary and proper in order to allow SPS to implement and effectuate the relief in the final order issued in this case.

3. SPS's proposal to construct, operate, and maintain the Wind Facilities and enter into the Bonita PPA would affect all of SPS's New Mexico retail customers.

4. The Commission has assigned Case No. 17-00044-UT to this Application, and all correspondence, pleadings, inquiries, written comments, or other communications concerning this matter should refer to that case number.

5. The present procedural schedule for this proceeding established in the Procedural Order issued by the Hearing Examiner on April 7, 2017 is as follows:

a. Any person desiring to become a party to this case must file the original and five copies of a motion for leave to intervene in conformity with Rules 1.2.2.23(A) and 1.2.2.23(B) NMAC on or before May 22, 2017. All motions for leave to intervene shall be served on all existing parties and other proposed intervenors of record.

b. The Utility Division Staff ("Staff") shall, and any intervenors may, file direct testimony on or before July 18, 2017, or in the alternative, any uncontested stipulation and any required documents pursuant to 1.2.2.20. NMAC, may be filed by July 18, 2017.

c. Opposition to any stipulation pursuant to 1.2.2.20(B) NMAC shall be filed by July 24, 2017.

d. Rebuttal testimony may be filed on or before August 3, 2017 or in the alternative, testimony in support of any stipulation shall be filed by August 3, 2017.

e. Testimony in opposition to any stipulation shall be filed by August 8, 2017.

f. A public hearing will be held on August 15, 2017 starting at 9:30 A.M. in the Ground Floor Hearing Room of the Commission in the P.E.R.A.
